Weekly Centering Prayer at The House of Hope

Mondays, 11 a.m., Kirk Parlour Beginning January 9, 2017

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer that prepares us to receive the gift of contemplative prayer, prayer in which we experience God's presence within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than consciousness itself. This method of prayer is both a relationship with God and a discipline to foster that relationship.

Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer. Rather, it adds depth of meaning to all prayer and facilitates the movement from more active modes of prayer—verbal, mental or affective prayer—into a receptive prayer of resting in God. Centering Prayer emphasizes prayer as a personal relationship with God and as a movement beyond conversation and into communion with The Christ.

Beginners as well as long time practitioners are welcome; there will be an introduction to the practice at the beginning of each gathering.

An Afternoon with Wesley Lowery Reporter for *The Washington Post*

Wesley Lowery works as a national reporter for *The Washington Post*, covering law enforcement, justice, race and politics. He was a member of a Pulitzer Prize winning report team that developed The Fatal Force database detailing police shootings and the surrounding circumstances. Lowery has won numerous other journalism awards including "Emerging Journalist of the Year" from the National Association of Black Journalists.

Prior to joining the *Washington Post* in February 2014, he worked as a breaking news and local politics reporter for the *Boston Globe*, and has also reported for the *Los Angeles Times* and the *Wall Street Journal*.

Lowery is the author of the recently released book *They Can't Kill Us All: Ferguson, Baltimore, and a New Era in America's Racial Justice Movement. The Minneapolis Star Tribune* deemed it an "insightful and unnerving inspection of the police and vigilante killings of black Americans since [Trayvon] Martin." From his reporting in Ferguson, which included an arrest while covering the protests following the fatal shooting of Michael Brown, to more recent coverage of protests following the presidential election, Lowery is at the forefront of modern journalism and the discussion about race in America.

Sabbatical



Welcome to 2017 and what promises to be a year of national change and adjustment. I am beginning the new year with a three month sabbatical, graciously granted to me by the Session. Unlike a vacation, where I still receive my church e-mail on my all-toohandy phone, meaning I'm never really away from work, this time of sabbatical

will be different. I will not have access to my church email. As I anticipate this special time away from home and familiar routine, the words from Romans 12:2 come to mind, "Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind." We will then spend some time in Amsterdam, where we always marvel at the way the locals resemble our aunts and uncles, or people we knew growing up, and how connected in our bones that place makes us we feel. We will then be in Edinburgh, Scotland, where Nancy and I lived twenty years ago while I was in graduate school. We will make a brief stop in London before returning home and going back to work. My prayer for this time away is that I will discover again ways to drink from God's life-giving waters, allowing me to regain enthusiasm, creativity and energy for the next phase of my ministry.

Upon my return, I will not ease back into things slowly, as the Didier Seminar will be ready to begin. And I couldn't be more pleased about this year's timely topic and speaker. Dr. Eddie Glaude, Jr, will be our guest and we are extremely fortunate to have him joining us. The Didier Committee has put out much information on him, as well as a recommended list of readings and videos. I encourage you to read some of their recommendations and plan to be a part of this important and historic seminar. I am also thrilled The Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, the Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church (USA) will be joining us as well, and will be preaching on Palm Sunday. The highest elected officer in our
