






PRAYER OF CONFESSION (Unison)







CHILDCARE. Modeling Jesus and his words in Mark 10:14 to "let the children come," The House of Hope welcomes children of all ages and their joyful sounds. We also provide sacred spaces each Sunday with professional childcare givers in the following locations: •Infants through 18 months are cared for in the Nursery Room (Room 8). •Toddlers age 18 months through age 3 are cared for in the Toddler Room (Room 2).

ADULT ENRICHMENT. Reformation, Reformations, and "The" Reformation. Presbyterians proudly characterize their church as "Reformed and Always Reforming" but how are we to understand this phrase in a year when we, paradoxically, celebrate the 500th anniversary of "The" Reformation? What does it mean to reform? Was there one reformation, were there many, or did St. Augustine have it right 1,000 years before Luther in writing Ecclesia semper reformanda est [the church is always reforming]? Professors Calvin Roetzel and Paul Solon presenting today at 11:15 in the Assembly Room.

Many practitioners say that it helps bring more calm even in the most stressful situations and others have noted lower blood pressure among its health benefits. Three years after that, he was excommunicated. Five hundred years later, Andrew and Sarah Wilson walked the same 1,000 miles to Rome, seeing what Luther saw—and much of what he didn't. Thousands followed their pilgrimage online and through reports in The Christian Century, First Things, The Wall Street Journal, and Books & Culture. European travel guru Rick Steves later interviewed the pair on his popular radio program. They turned this experience into a book, Here I Walk: A Thousand Miles on Foot to Rome with Martin Luther. The Wilsons used the experience of their pilgrimage to explore the implications of the Reformation for the modern Protestant and Roman Catholic churches.
