
A Reading from The First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

It is a theological defense against racism written during the struggle against Apartheid in South Africa and adopted by our denomination at the General Assembly in June of 2016.

On the fringes of the Protestant Reformation flourished numerous forms of Christian faith and practice, from radical extremists who helped foment bloody revolution in Germany to the more rationally minded anti-Trinitarians who anticipated the views of modern Unitarians. In between were the Anabaptists who insisted on "believers (or 'adult') baptism" as well as pacifism. GREAT DECISIONS. Nuclear proliferation was a top priority for the Obama administration. While the Iran deal was a diplomatic victory, major threats were emerging to challenge the new U.S. administration. Foremost was North Korea, but also included ongoing threats from Russia, India, and Pakistan. All were challenging non-proliferation efforts. The possibility of terrorists using a "dirty bomb" made from captured materials looked increasingly real. In a fractious world, which way is forward for U.S. Foreign Policy? Our guest speaker on Tuesday, October 10 at 4 p.m. will be George Welles. He is Principal and Founder of Imaging Futures, Inc. and a Senior Fellow at the University of Minnesota.
