




PRAYER OF CONFESSION (Unison)





ADULT ENRICHMENT. The Anabaptists: A Sixteenth-Century Protestant Alternative. On the fringes of the Protestant Reformation flourished numerous forms of Christian faith and practice, from radical extremists who helped foment bloody revolution in Germany to the more rationally minded anti-Trinitarians who anticipated the views of modern Unitarians. In between were the Anabaptists who insisted on "believers (or 'adult') baptism" as well as pacifism. They were severely persecuted by both Protestants and Catholics alike because they were seen as a threat to a stable society. Stephen Brachlow will be the presenter at 11:15 a.m. today in the Assembly Room.

GET INVOLVED WITH PROJECT HOME. A project of Interfaith Action of Greater Saint Paul, Project Home engages area faith communities to provide emergency shelter space and volunteer support for Ramsey County families facing homelessness.
