Sunday Series | Dr. Michael Eric Dyson

Dr. Michael Eric Dyson addressed church members and community members interested in learning about his view of race relations in America. Dr. Dyson is a Georgetown University sociology professor, a *New York Times* contributing opinion writer, a contributing editor of *The New Republic*, and of ESPN's The Undefeated website. Dr. Dyson shared his personal call for change.

Associate Pastor Jeff Foels posed the questions: What next? What can *we* do? Dr. Dyson responded:

- 1. Speak up. Tell the truth. Do not subscribe to the "United States of Amnesia" that forgets all that has happened to bring us to this point.
- 2. Help where you are needed—on the ground, if you can. Reach out with resources and act as a beacon of light in the community.
- 3. Be vocal about criminal justice.

Consider the gift of intelligent conversation for Father's Day. Give Dr. Dyson's next book, What Truth Sounds Like: Robert F. Kennedy, James Baldwin, and Our Unfinished Conversation About Race in America.

In 1963, Robert F. Kennedy asked James Baldwin to organize a small gathering of prominent African-Americans to discuss segregation and discrimination. In this book, Dyson uses that meeting for an incisive look at the roles of politicians, intellectuals, and activists in confronting racial injustice. A Thinking Church

Reverend Dr. Andrew McDonald



I am a Presbyterian because that is the church in which my parents chose to raise my brother and me. I am a Presbyterian

minister because of the pastor at my home church. I had come to an ethical crisis in college, and I talked with my minister about it. In that one conversation, he talked about history, theology, ethics, psychology, and the Bible. What he had to say was more interesting than what was said in my college classes—and my college classes were great.

By the end of the conversation, he did not give me an answer to my quandary. Instead, he gave me tools to think it through myself.

Over the years, I have become grateful for Presbyterianism's founder, John Calvin. Calvin was originally trained as a lawyer. He was a careful thinker. The church followed the form of its founder. The Presbyterian Church grew to be a place of educated engagement regarding challenging problems in the world. It is inspiring to be part of House of Hope. It is an exemplary congregation as it nurtures such a strong, wonderful atmosphere that values faithful education.

House of Hope also stands as a faithful pillar against simplistic religion. Simplistic religion is shallow. A walk through the ocean of simplistic religion would barely get your toes wet. The world has complex problems—it needs a faith that is deep and articulate enough to offer guidance and hope in every age.

Simplistic religion is also arrogant. It has all the answers and is not interested in any real discussion. Presbyterians have a long tradition of recognizing that people of good faith may have different opinions. Living in the midst of ambiguity allows us to see beyond our individual selves. With this broader vision comes the possibility of hearing the Holy Spirit say something new.

I am grateful for Andrew Overman's Didier Seminar and Michael Eric Dyson's Sunday Series lecture. Both were challenging and both gave us much to think about. These kinds of lectures lead us to think again about how God is calling us to live faithfully in the world.

Now it's June—the beginning of summer. A time when a great many of us engage that most faithful activity—reading. It stretches the imagination. It challenges preconceived ideas. It takes us some place new. If you come across a book that you find to be a great read, please, let your friends know about it. And please, let me know too. Thinking together is part of what we Presbyterians do.

The Book of Creation

by J. Philip Newell

J. Philip Newell uses each day of creation to describe an aspect of God. One of his early books, it reflects his spiritual growth during the time he served as the warden of the Abbey on the island of Iona.

The relationship between Christianity and ancient pagan cultures in the Celtic world is unique. Living on Iona prompted Newell to reorient his study, open his mind, expand his language and imagery, and let God work in his life. This book asks us to look at the creation story in

Genesis 1, as "a meditation on the ever-present mystery of creation." Each chapter includes thought-provoking images of who God is and how God works, using ancient and modern wisdom sources and then ends with a guided meditation that is an invitation to awareness and prayer.

This short read enlivens faith and our connection with God and life through poetry, prose, metaphor, and story and invites us to enter into the Light, Wildness, Fecundity, Harmony, Creatureliness, Image, and Stillness of God.

Geopolitical allies and challengers alike are paying close attention.

Molly Hayes served as a foreign affairs officer with the U.S. State Department, as a counter terrorism advisor for East Africa, as well as assignments for several Middle East and African countries. She was deputy coordinator for the State Department's Egypt Task Force during the 2011 Arab Spring.

The Life of Christ in Art, selections from the Westminster Collection By Dr. Rodney Allen Schwartz Director, the Westminster Gallery and Archive

Westminster Presbyterian Church has always displayed Christian art. When the Westminster Gallery was formed in 2002, so too was an intentional effort to build a collection. Over these ensuing years, the collection has grown broadly to include The Transfiguration by Sadao Watanabe (1913-1996) Katazome stencil print, #25/70, 1971

many artists and deeply to tell a variety of biblical stories. Westminster is pleased to share some of this collection with the members and visitors of House of Hope in an exhibition this summer.

The exhibition features a broad spectrum of artists representing multi-cultural and multi-ethnic viewpoints depicting the events of Christ's life. Molas made by the Cuna Indians on the San Blass Islands off of Panama, stencil prints made by the Japanese artist Sadao Watanabe, and linocut prints by Robert Hodgell are just a few of the artists and techniques featured.

Art can be both beautiful to look at and challenging to encounter. Our experience with the difficult dimensions of Christ's passion gives us pause to contemplate the basis of our faith. We anticipate a happy ending to the story and can rejoice with the art as we engage these various images.

Traveling this summer?

Planning a long road trip this summer or some extended time at the lake? Whatever your plans, summer can bring space to slow down and find time to connect with your children. Help your child grow in the love of God's message with some fun Bible games and activities.

License Plate Bible Book Game

Name books of the Bible that start with the letters on the license plate of the car in front of you. If the license plate has multiple letters, name a book for each letter and then for an added challenge, put the books in the order you would find them in the Bible.

Bible 20 Questions

Take turns thinking of a person, place or story from the Bible and the rest of the family can ask up to 20 yes or no questions until someone guesses who or what you were thinking of.

Roll the Dice

Bring a large die along with you in the

car (you can find inflatable ones or large plastic ones at teacher supply shops and party shops). Take turns rolling the die and naming as many books of the Bible as the number shown on the top of the die. Older kids and adults should name books in order for the added challenge.

God is... Alphabet Game

Go through the alphabet trying to name truths about God for each letter of the alphabet and trying to remember the previously stated truths. For example, the first person says, "God is awesome," the second person says, "God is awesome and big," the third person says, "God is awesome, big and creator," etc. Try to make it through the whole alphabet.
