The Bible is profound, not only in what it says, but in what it does not say. A case in point is the resurrection of Jesus. The Bible does not tell us how, or when, or what exactly happened. If we want to know "just the facts," it does not answer that question. As if to say, "Those are the wrong questions."

What the Bible tells us is about the experience of the faithful. Somehow they experienced the resurrected Jesus. From what the Bible says, there were a variety of these experiences. One in the garden. Two walking on the road. And yet another story by the lakeside. And there are others—stories told by disciples sharing their experience of the living Lord.

It was the most profound experience of their lives. A transcendent experience that transformed the disciples. In the experience of the resurrection, God transforms death into life, doubters into believers, tears of mourning into tears of joy, failure into future, defeat into eternal victory. As the Bible puts it, "Out of darkness, light."

For us, the experience of the resurrection of Christ means that no matter how overwhelming the problem is, there is an even greater source of hope. And this source of hope is reaching out to connect with us.

We celebrate Easter to help us to open up our hearts, minds, and lives to the experience of the living Lord. It is not something we achieve. It is a gift made possible through the Holy Spirit. As we move through the last days of Lent, may our lives be ready to experience anew the gift God gives us in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Out of darkness, light!

When we convene on the evening of Maundy Thursday, we annually present Healey Willan's tenderly striking Tenebrae Responses in tandem with read scripture. This year's Good Friday Vespers service features the choir, organ, and orchestra on Maurice Duruflé's Requiem, a poignant work rooted in the composer's love of Gregorian chant and its re-imagining through Romantic French harmonies. On Easter morning, the choirs and brass present festive works (Byrd: Haec dies) that celebrate the resurrection and remind us that "This is the day the Lord has made." House of Hope is moving forward.

I want to thank everyone who participated in our in-home focus

groups. It was great to hear your insights about this church. And I want to thank the 30 people who were part of the visioning meetings. They did an outstanding job. All of that information was put into a report that provided the Twin Cities Presbytery with the mission study that they ask for before a pastoral search begins.

The great news is: We are ready for the next step. The Session voted to form a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). This will be made up of nine members of the congregation. When these members have been identified, a congregational meeting will be called to vote on the PNC. The PNC will then begin the process of searching for House of Hope's next Head of Staff Pastor. How long will this take? That depends on the work of the PNC and the Holy Spirit. Usually it takes around a year, but it can happen sooner or later. The goal is to find the "right fit" between the church and your next Head of Staff Pastor.

This is an exciting time. I hope you keep the church, the PNC, and your new pastor in your prayers. House of Hope is an amazing church. God is calling you to a wonderful future.

March 2019 Session Minutes

Transitional Pastor Report

Transitional Pastor Andrew McDonald has completed a second course of Transitional Pastor training. On March 14, the Called Positions Committee of the Presbytery will determine if HOH has sufficient information from our Visioning Committee and house meetings to begin searching for a new Head of Staff Pastor and forming a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). Rev. McDonald distributed a packet with outlines and commentary from the Visioning Committee, Visioning Sub-Committees and house meetings.

Kitchen Workgroup Report

Elder Jenny Stevens reported that the Kitchen Committee is discussing how HVAC system renovations may correspond with other potential renovations. Rough estimates for building project scenarios were distributed.

Stewardship Committee Report

Committee Chair Sherwood Pomeroy distributed a February Stewardship report. He highlighted a group of members who pledged last year and have not done so this year. He also reported that the committee would like to organize a task force to explore the feasibility of a capital campaign.

Mission Outreach

During the Trump administration, the usual ways of conducting diplomacy have been upended. Many positions in the State Department have never been filled. Meetings with foreign leaders, such as Vladimir Putin and Kim Jong-un, have been undertaken with little advance planning. What effects are these changes having and how will they affect ongoing relationships between the United States and its allies and its adversaries?

For most of the past 41 years, Mark Canning was a diplomat in the State Department. He has lived in Poland, South Africa, Zambia, Czech Republic, Hungary, Korea, and China. He has lectured on North Korea and mentored at the Army War College (based in North Korea). Since retiring in 2018, he teaches Chinese at Concordia College.

Stewardship 2019



First and foremost: thank all of you for your generous pledges and gifts.

I'm pleased to report that we are ahead of last

year. We have received pledges from 349 households including 34 new pledges for a total of \$1,161,674. The average pledge is \$3,329 and the mean pledge is \$2,000. \$1,161,674 is great, but it is 92% of the goal—we are still \$108,000 short.

We can make up the difference. You should have recently received a letter regarding Per Capita, the cost of being a Presbyterian and support for its mission. We can eliminate this shortfall by donating Per Capita costs, as well as through the generosity of those who have not yet pledged this year, and through a little extra giving by each of us. We all need to show our love for this church and all its blessings. **An additional \$6 per week from every giving household would raise \$109,000.**

The Budget Committee noted the shortfall in pledges, as well as the extraordinary expenses due to weather. Above-budget items include heat, snow removal, ice dam removal, and extra salt for the walkways. Water damage from the ice dams was beginning to show and the unexpected ice dam removal cost for the church and the Manse amounted to \$22,000. It took crews more than 52 hours at a rate of \$400 per hour.

So what can we do?

- 4. Pledge by pledge card or calling the church office and talking to Michelle.

- 6. Consider direct giving from your IRA.
- 7. Make giving easier and automatic by setting up automatic payments via My HOH.

To carry out our mission, our vision for the future, to maintain and update this beautiful, old building, to secure the best in new leadership requires a strong financial commitment. We all need to show crazy love for this place. —Sherwood Pomeroy, Committee Chair

After working in painting and photography, Tim Harding became intrigued with the intimacy of fiber and textiles: their textural, tactile richness, the inherent grid of the weave, the pliable plane. He uses simultaneous contrast—multiple solid colors arranged in tight proximity—to create the kind of vibrant richness associated with the impressionists.
