

Will you come into the darkness of today's world; not the friendly darkness as when sleep rescues us from tiredness, but the fearful darkness, in which people have stopped believing that war will end or that food will come or that a government will change or that the Church cares?

Will you come into that darkness and do something different to save your people from death and despair?

Will you come into the quietness of this city, not the friendly quietness as when snow falls in beauty and silence, but the fearful silence when the phone has not rung, the letter has not come, the friendly voice no longer speaks, the doctor's face says it all?

Will you come into that darkness, and do something different, not to distract, but to embrace your people? And will you come into the dark corners and the quiet places of our lives?

We ask this not because we are guilt-ridden or want to be, but because the fullness our lives long for depends on us being as open and vulnerable to you as you were to us, when you came. Wearing no more than a diaper, and trusting human hands to hold their maker.

Will you come into our lives, if we open them to you and do something different?

When the world was dark and the city was quiet you came. You crept in beside us. Do the same this Christmas, Lord. Do the same this Christmas.

For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory, forever. Amen.



Peace & Justice Forum: The Devastation of Community Gun Violence, 11:15 a.m. in the Library. The presenters will be Kelvin Christoph, a "Ujamaa Man" who will speak about his life experience with gun violence, and Rev. Nancy Nord Bence, Director of Protect MN who will speak about gun violence from a public health perspective, and give us an overview of the legislation regarding gun violence prevention at the State Legislature this session.

January 12: Speaker from State of Minnesota, Paul Mandell - Capital Renovation Findings

Rev. Julia Carlson's Doctor of Ministry Research Activity. Do you wonder what the 'Nones' and the 'Dones' think about, worry over, or believe? I know! do.

A year ago, I interviewed eight folks who do not regularly attend church using six simple questions. Some were strangers I walked up to at National Night Out, and others were friends or family that I met through HOH members. It was a wonderful experience – an enlightening experience.

Because I believe it will be enlightening for you and help us all gain greater understanding of our neighbors, I am inviting you to interview one or two of your neighbors who do not attend church using a few open and non-judgmental questions. There will be a training session on January 5, 2020, after worship at 11:15 in Room 1. There will be additional training sessions on Wednesday, January 8, at 1:00 p.m., and again at 5:30 p.m.

There will be several opportunities to gather in small groups afterwards to talk about your experience.

# **Upcoming Sunday Series Speakers**

Leonard Pitts, Jr. January 19 | 2:00 p.m.

A former writer for Casey Kasem's radio program "American Top 40," Leonard Pitts, Jr. was a pop music critic at the Miami Herald where he began writing about race and current affairs in his own column. Today, his Miami Herald newspaper column on current affairs, human rights and human wrongs, is syndicated in more than 250 daily newspapers. Pitts was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in 1992 and winner in 2004. He won the top prize for commentary at the Scripps Howard Foundation's National Journalism Awards in 2002.

David Brooks March 29 | 2:00 p.m.

Author, Bi-weekly Op-Ed columnist for the *New York Times*, and analyst on PBS NewsHour and NPR's All Things Considered.

# Didier Seminar: Dr. John Haught February 29 & March 1

John F. Haught is Senior Fellow, Science and Religion, at the Woodstock Theological Center at Georgetown University, where he has taught courses such as The Problem of God, Theological Method, Science and Religion, and Religion and Ecology. He is a member of the American Academy of Religion, the Center for Process Studies, The Metanexus Institute, and other professional organizations. He lectures internationally on many issues related to science and religion. In 2002 he was the winner of the Owen Garrigan Award in Science and Religion and in 2004 the Sophia Award for Theological Excellence. Additionally, Dr. Haught was the only theologian to testify as an expert witness in the landmark 2005 Dover trial that ruled against teaching intelligent design in public schools (Kitzmiller et al. vs. Dover Board of Education).
