

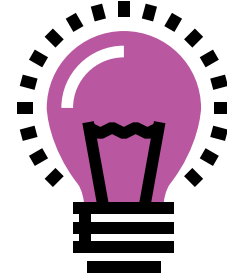

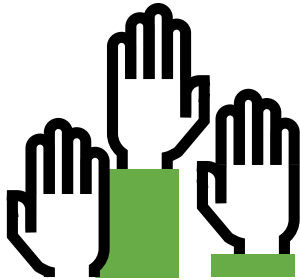

During this year of transition, the Session and Committees are committed to maintaining excellence in worship, music, sacraments, and nurturing the members of the congregation, friends of the congregation, and community partnerships. The Session is inspired by your stewardship that supports our goals. We thank our church staff who carry out all the many responsibilities and areas of their expertise that support our congregation and care of the church building. The Pastor Nominating Committee was elected and has worked together this past year to lead the search for our next pastor. We express appreciation to the Rev. Dr. Andrew McDonald as he has served as our Transitional Pastor and prepares us to welcome a new Head of Staff.

The Budget Committee is the coordinating body of the Session and provides a coordination function for Session approval and ensures that expenditures throughout the fiscal year fall within approved budget limits. The Budget Committee meets monthly and prepares the annual report, annual budget, annual goals, and annual leadership transition. The Budget Committee establishes and maintains guidelines for all committee chairs in preparing annual budget submissions and provides training in their use.

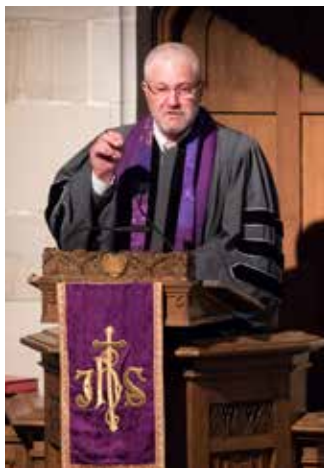
Provided three **Elizabeth Chapel Series** music concerts.

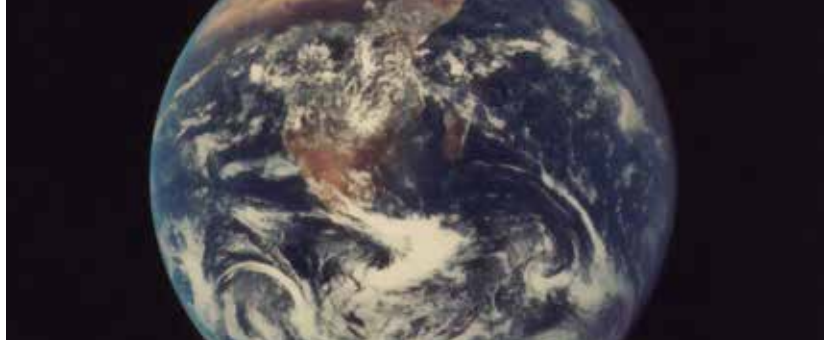

House of Hope is pursuing designation as an **Earth Care Congregation** by the PC(USA). We applied for that certification in January 2020.

The **Peace and Justice Committee** sponsored the "Forum on Peace and Justice Advocacy" in November 2019.

Through our working groups, the committee presented education programs on child abuse, affordable healthcare, criminal justice, the Equal Rights Amendment, ending homelessness, and gun violence prevention. We take our mission seriously, "to provide a church forum for peace-making and justice issues."

The **Arts Committee** showcases various local artists in our beautiful Cloister Art Gallery. During 2019, we presented the paintings of **Carolyn Brunelle** in January, botanical printmaker **Linda Snouffer** in February, and the **Children's Art Show** in March. Perhaps the highlight of the year was in April of **Tim Harding's** fiber display and artist presentation during Adult Enrichment, since it coordinated with the unveiling on Easter morning of the first of six sets of paraments that he created for House of Hope. The **Member Art Show** is always a favorite as it gives all members of the congregation an opportunity to display at least one piece of art during the summer months. September began with photographs of the **Ireland and Scotland pilgrimages** led by our own Rev. Julia Carlson, then Stillwater painter **Charlotte Schuld** displayed her art in October/November, and a **Christmas Memories** display of nostalgic items adorned the gallery in December. The fabulous Arts Committee installs each new show with artistic flair, in record time with lots of good cheer and laughter!

House of Hope : Mission Incubator for Housing

Whoever is kind to the poor lends to the Lord, and he will reward them for what they have done.
(Proverbs 19:17)

The Mission Outreach Committee embraces House of Hope's mission as **"the beating heart of the church"** by showing God's love and grace to all.

HOH congregants contributed more than **\$46,183** through the Harvest of Hope Bash. A passion for **Mission Outreach**—locally, nationally, and internationally—shines brightly through our congregation, as it has for more than 100 years.

For more than 20 years, House of Hope has hosted **Project Home** during October. In 2019, 22 adults and children received healthy snacks, help with homework, and fellowship through games and activities at House of Hope. When the weather turned cold and alternative shelter space was overflowing, these families found safe harbor through our community partner Interfaith Action of Greater Saint Paul.

In 2019, HOH supported **34 nonprofits and organizations** through donations, grants, advocacy assistance, and volunteer time. These organizations provide local impact and were among those receiving HOH grants: Habitat for Humanity, Ain Dah Yung, Prior Crossing, YWCA, Jeremiah Program, People Incorporated, Feed My Starving Children, and the Boys & Girls Clubs.

Nationally and internationally, we support the work of the PC(USA)'s Presbyterian Mission: disaster relief, hunger, housing, theological education, and the mission work of Rev. Joshua Heikkila, within Ghana, Africa.

Your generosity impacted the lives of thousands of children and adults.



The Ain Dah Yung Center

Forty-two American Indian young adults who were previously experiencing homelessness found a home at **Mino Oski Ain Dah Yung** in 2019. House of Hope pledged \$30,000 a year for five years to support this project. As of the end of 2019, we have paid \$90,000 out of our \$150,000 goal. These funds come from the Houses of Hope Endowment fund. We also provided the bedding for the first set of residents. Rev. Zach Wilson, Mission Outreach Chair Nancy Sabin, and several church members were blessed to go on a hard-hat tour of the new building in August 2019.

HOH's passion to end homelessness continues through support for Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative.

27 new residents found a home at **Prior Crossing** in 2019. Our congregation provided household items and linens to help them set up their first apartment. HOH volunteers provide hospitality through donations, birthday bags, and a winter party. Thank you for your generosity in helping to make homes for these youth.





Local families who struggle with hunger enjoyed more than **1,040 pounds of fresh produce from our community garden**. The countless volunteer hours invested in the garden also build community within the church and beyond.



HOH works hard with **Ujamaa Place** to effect change in criminal justice reform, employment mentoring, and the need for basic services for African American males and their families who strive to be a vibrant part of the community.

House of Hope Membership Development Committee

Members of this committee have worked to expand our vision for church growth in 2019–2020.

Activities and results include:

- **Set a new member goal for the program year of 40 new members.** Twenty-two have joined so far.
 - **Featured education opportunities and events for the fall in the September Anchor.** We distributed 4,999 copies to the community surrounding HOH and members shared copies with their neighbors.
 - **Advertised HOH events** through Minnesota Public Radio, area newspapers, and our Facebook page. This engagement significantly increased traffic on the HOH webpage—we saw a 70% increase in new visitors!
 - **Organized Wednesday Evening Community Dinners to help connect members within the church.**
 - For 2020, we are researching **name badges** for members to create a welcoming atmosphere and updating signage at our entrances.

Children and Family Ministry

Children and Family Ministry is thriving at House of Hope. We strive to equip children with the skills needed to lead a full and meaningful life and to create a safe environment in which they can thrive. In 2019, we:

- **Served 85 children** (birth–11 years) through informative classes and fun-filled activities.
- **Welcomed several new babies**, setting up Meal Train calendars to support families discovering a new life rhythm.
- **Facilitated family story time** before worship on Sundays, while elementary students are invited to participate in theater or visual arts programs after worship.
- **Taught elementary students about Scripture** through stories, art, games, and activities with the help of our Sunday school teaching teams and the Dwell Digital curriculum.
- **Engaged our tweens in monthly events.**
- **Provided engaging multigenerational events for families and community members** to enjoy such as our Community Retreat at Clearwater Forest, Halloween Party, the Advent Celebration, and other events.

Youth Ministry

- **Served 50 middle school and high school youth** through classes and events.
- **Confirmed 16 youth** in their faith journey.
- **Collected \$1,600 through Souper Bowl of Caring** for local food pantries.
- **Engaged middle school youth in Mission Day** where they volunteered their time in the HOH Community Garden, and at Neighborhood House, Como Lake, and Feed My Starving Children.

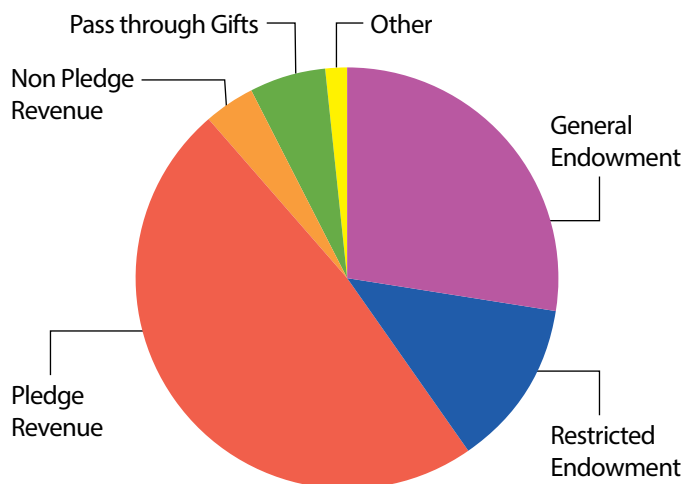

Investment and Audit Committee of Trustees

The annual gifts of members and the House of Hope Endowment make the worship and work of this congregation possible. The Endowment is carefully managed so what is drawn maintains the health of the fund. Last year the Endowment contributed more than \$1 million to fund a budget of over \$2.5 million.

The Endowment increased in 2019 from a strong stock market and from the sale of two Summit Avenue properties. The balance at year's end was \$29 million an increase of 18% on the year. The annual financial audit was satisfactory and accepted by the Trustees.

Gifts to the Endowment are lasting and important. As members before have blessed us, so can we benefit those who will follow. —Kathleen Schubert, Chair
