Litany of Remembrance for Maundy Thursday

Minister: You have heard the words of Jesus from this table over and over again,

do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: The Lord Jesus, on the night of his arrest, took break and after giving thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples saying: Take, eat. This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: In the same way he took the cup, saying: this cup is the new covenant sealed in my blood, shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink of it, do this in remembrance of me.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: This year when we cannot gather in order to protect one another from the coronavirus Covid-19, we are invited to remember God's presence in our lives until we re-member this Body of Christ. God created heaven and earth. God brought forth the vine and the fruit of the vine that eventually fills the cup. God planted and tends the grains that make the bread, the one loaf that feeds us all.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: God made humanity in God's own image, equal and free; God made human beings of all colors and sizes, to enjoy the earth and a life of spirit and truth. We have not always allowed others equality. We have not always allowed everyone to be free. God still sends prophets to call us back to God's own Spirit and Truth.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: Hearing the word read and preached in this sanctuary, we have been fed again and again. Hearing the word preached in song by youthful and mature voices we have been gifted by God's love. We have heard the word sung in many keys and rhythms; the sound has filled the timbers and reverberated off the stones until the stones are alive and speaking to us. The Word has taken our breath away.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: In the Kirk Parlour you have been the Session or the Board of Deacons to participate with God in God's mission. In the Assembly Room we have been enriched, and fed, and played. In the Great Hall we have feasted in celebrations, choir school dinners, and hosted AA. Here in God's house, we have centered in prayer, mourned our losses, and celebrated lives.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: You have shared the love of God and your life stories and faith at the Men's breakfasts, Sunday-Weekday Connections and The Women's Book Group.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: In the Children's Library you have heard stories and down the hall, you have had Sunday School, Tweens, and Creative Expressions. In the sacrament of baptism you have smiled in deep joy because of the newest and sometimes youngest members in the church family.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: In the sacrament of communion, you have passed the plate of bread and taken a share; and in walking forward for intinction, you have been fed again and again by the body of Christ.

Do you remember?

People: We remember.

Minister: God who is holy, is our host. God is our provider and the tie that binds. Whenever and wherever we eat bread we can remember Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again. We remember, Gracious God, and pray that you would pour out your Spirit upon us in all the places we are gathered on this night. We pray you would bless our Maundy Thursday fast until we can claim this bread and cup together in this place. We are a Body re-membered by the ties that bind – and a Body fed by your own hand. Hear us now, as from many places we pray together:

Our Father, who is in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen.
