- Traffic flow will be single direction in some areas, and physically distanced chairs will be provided.
- Hand sanitizer, hand-washing stations, and porta potties will be provided.
- Parking will be available in the Holly lot, HOH's Summit parking lot, and street parking.
- We ask that you stay safely home if you're not feeling well or are at greater risk due to health conditions.

Anjali Kumar: "The Hope of the Quest"

Ms. Kumar's TED Talk based on her book *Stalking God: My Unorthodox Search For Something To Believe In,* has been watched by more than four million people. Kumar has worked as the Chief People Officer at Chedder, Head of Social Innovation at Warby Parker, and Senior Counsel at Google.



Melvin Carter: "The Hope of Saint Paul"

Mayor Carter is the 46th, and first African-American mayor of the City of Saint Paul. A fourth-generation Saint Paul resident, his accomplishments include raising the minimum wage and expanding immigrant and refugee support services.



Dennis Overbye: "The Hope of Science" Science Editor of *The New York Times*, Mr. Overbye's reporting

ranges from zero-gravity fashion shows and science in the movies to the status of Pluto, the death of the Earth, and the fate of the universe.



Marcus Hummon: "The Hope of Frederick Douglass"

Grammy winner, Hall of Fame songwriter, and composer of award-winning musicals, Mr. Hummon will speak on his new musical *American Prophet* that tells the inspiring story of Frederick Douglass.

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Kristin Kobes Du Mez: "The Hope for the Evangelical Church" A professor at Calvin University, Ms. Kobes Du Mez

will speak about her recent book: *Jesus* and John Wayne: How White Evangelicals Corrupted a Faith and Fractured a Nation.

Rob Wilson-Black: "The Hope of the Church" Mr. Wilson-Black is CEO of Sojourners, a journal situated at the intersection of


faith, politics, and culture.


Choir School

Reverberations

In April, the large set of House of Hope handbells traveled to a bell shop in Michigan—one of only two shops in the United States which specializes in bells made by the Whitechapel Bell Foundry in Great Britain. The task: a complete refurbishment of bells after 42 years of continual ringing in rehearsals, services, and festivals. The bells returned late July, were in guarantine for a week, and are now ready to ring. You will hear a more consistent tone from the bells which will allow the ringers to balance their bell sound (without frustration) among each other for a better musical experience. A Year Later

On September 20, 2019, members of House of Hope and other area churches participated in the local Youth Climate Strike held on the capitol grounds in St. Paul. We were there to support thousands of young people rallying with millions around the world to demand action to halt climate change. They carried signs with messages like "You'll die of old age, I'll die of climate change,""The climate is changing, why aren't we?", and "Help!"

A year later, those messages—though no less urgent, have largely been overshadowed by the global pandemic and worldwide anti-racism civil unrest. Yet, we have also witnessed how our own wellbeing is interconnected to the health of our planet. While under Stayat-Home orders, we saw that it took only weeks for the skies in polluted cities to clear as emissions dropped, and to experience peaceful bird chirps replacing traffic noise. As we continue to shelter in place, may we each connect with our planet in sustainable ways that heed the urgent pleas of our youth to create a future for all.
