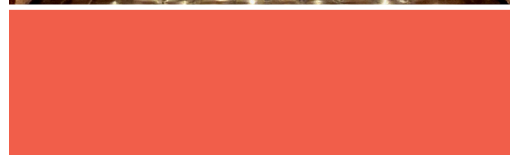
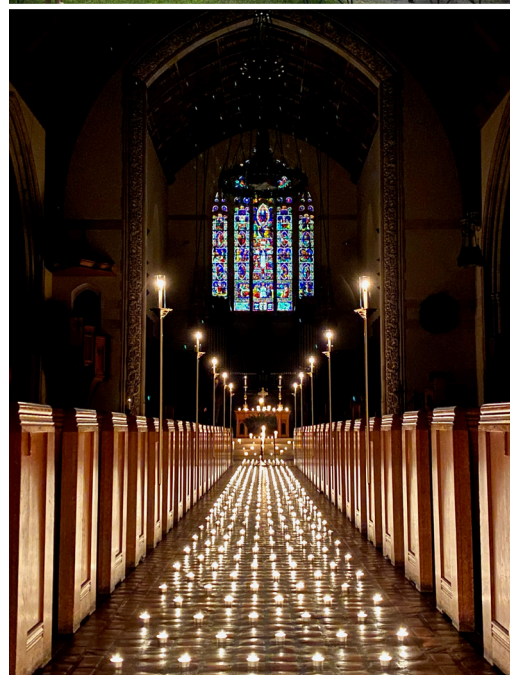

There are many ways in which we have experienced overflowing hope in the past year. We invite you to peruse the pages of this report and celebrate all we have imagined and realized by God's grace and leading. Below are just a few highlights:

- Growth in virtual Sunday services which now average 350 weekly logins;
- Significant progress on the 1-7-75-175 strategic plan;
- Launching of the Festival of Hope which was viewed by over 1000 people;
- Exceeding the Virtual Bash goal by 68% which raised \$84,000 for Mission Outreach;
- Hiring a Director for Youth and Family Ministry which laid the groundwork to develop The HUB, a dynamic new ministry to children, youth and families at the House of Hope and in our community.

In closing, we would like to extend a heartfelt word of gratitude to all the church officers, leaders, volunteers and our House of Hope staff who joined together to make 2020 a year that required our trust in God which ultimately resulted in the overflowing of hope in our future.

HOH hosted its annual community sing in conjunction with Tesfa Wondemagegnehu, The Singers, and Choirmaster Matthew Culloton. The event introduced new sections and favorites from *The Justice Choir Songbook*, a collection of music about civic, social, and environmental rights.



### Elizabeth Chapel Series | February 23

The Elizabeth Chapel Series presented a concert that featured Rachel Brandwein on the harp and Aaron David Miller on the Jaekel Organ. It included works of Bach, Renié, and two new compositions for harp and organ. A second recital featuring Aaron David Miller was streamed on April 19.



### Didier Seminar | February 29 and March 1

HOH welcomed theologian Dr. John F. Haught to speak about his book *The New Cosmic Story and the Meaning of Faith* stating that the universe and humans are "a package deal, interrelated and continually evolving." Phil Bolinder presented an overview of Haught's book and led discussions in advance of the event.





## **The COVID-19 pandemic limited in-person worship and activities | March 15**

HOH offered Easter worship virtually for the first time. Our community embraced this opportunity with more than 11,000 people viewing on CW Channel 23. The livestream was also widely viewed on our website and Facebook, drawing viewers from 47 states and six countries.

Weekly worship attendance grew throughout the year—attracting an average of 350 devices virtually each week. The Children and Family Ministry committee launched a 9:30 a.m. worship service on Sunday mornings under the leadership of Kiera Stegall and Sofia Ardalan.

## **Handbell Refurbishment | May**

## **Death of George Floyd | May 25**

HOH grieved with our community in the aftermath of the murder of George Floyd. HOH's Carillonneur Dave Johnson played the carillon on June 4 in George Floyd's honor.

HOH published this statement: *"We are called Protestants because our history is one of protest in naming what is wrong and unjust. Thousands have protested this injustice. House of Hope laments the outbreaks of violence and damage to lives and property and pray for peace to return to our metro area and state – even as we recognize the commitment that "peace is not the same as quiet." Jesus asked us to pick up our cross and follow him; it is our calling to stand with our neighbors and friends in the African American community as the only lasting and sure peace is one created through love and justice. God is love and our hope."*





## Community Garden | September

HOH members and friends grew and delivered 1,157 pounds of fresh produce to local food pantries.

## Leadership Jazz | September 12

Elders, Deacons, and Trustees gathered for an outdoor retreat to explore the topic of "Leadership Jazz: On Guiding the Church During Tumultuous Times." Participants enjoyed special music and a reflection on improvisation from HOH's Director of Music and Organist Aaron David Miller.

## Rally Sunday | September 13

HOH gathered under the "Big Tent" to kick off an amazing fall at House of Hope with socially distanced outdoor activities following our streamed worship. Following the guidelines of the Governor and the MN Department of Health, we enjoyed a picnic and reconnected as a congregation. HOH member Terry Bailey's band, Jazz Savvy, provided entertainment.

## 1-7-75-175 Initiative | September 15

The Session approved a 1-7-75-175 Initiative and set in motion a Long Range Planning Committee to assimilate input from the congregation and discern our mission and 7 major objectives we can tackle in the coming years as we move toward our 175th anniversary. Clearly, God is at work in our midst shaping a "future with hope."

## Festival of Hope | September 20–27

House of Hope launched a new online conference that attracted over 1,000 participants and included speakers who ranged from a *New York Times* science columnist to a Grammy winner, a leader in the field of furniture design to authors who spoke to the pressing issues of systemic racism and the impact of the evangelical church on American politics.

## Harvest of Hope Bash | October 25

Thank you to the more than 169 donors who contributed to the Bash. Gifts totaled \$84,000, which was 68% over the goal of \$50,000. The Mission Outreach Committee allocated grants to Mission Partners with an emphasis on supporting hunger and homelessness efforts. Grantees included: *Boys & Girls Clubs of the Twin Cities Area, Feed My Starving Children, Hallie Q. Brown Community Center, Interfaith Action of Greater Saint Paul/Project Home, Jeremiah Program, Neighborhood House, Ujamaa Place, Women's Advocates, among others.*







## HOH welcomed Director of Youth and Family Ministry | November 1

Dan Miglets-Nelson joined the HOH staff and launched virtual events that included Confirmation classes and a Christmas party, as well as Sponsor-a-Family gift drop off.



## Bible Presentations | November 1

Kindergarteners and third graders enjoyed a brief outdoor service to celebrate the receiving of Bibles, observing safety protocols. Kiera met with the third graders in Zoom classes to teach Bible navigation skills.



## First Light | November 29

To mark the beginning of Advent, the trees along Summit Avenue were lit to remind us that light is stronger than darkness. They were lit up every night through the winter.

Members and friends gathered on weekday mornings during Advent for a special 7 minute online worship service including prayers, devotions, and music. These services were posted daily at 7 a.m. on our website, Facebook, and Instagram pages.

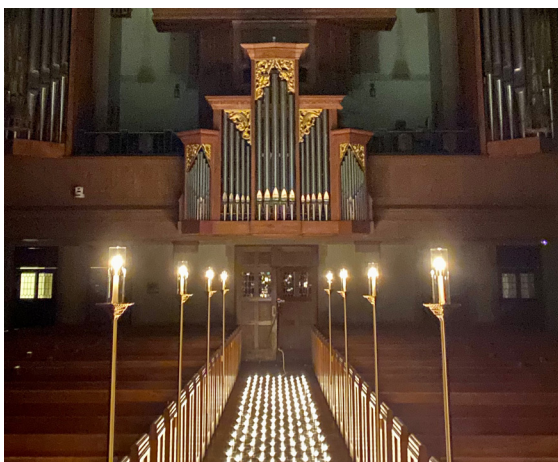


## All Church Christmas Parties | December 10 and 17

## Candlelight Christmas Eve Worship | December 24

Nearly 700 devices viewed our Candlelight Christmas Eve Worship service on our website and Facebook page. The service included anthems and carols performed by the section leaders of The Motet Choir and instrumentalists. About 100 children and families participated in our Family Christmas Eve Candlelight Worship service.

- Offer fellowship to people both inside and outside the church, listening to and respecting perspectives other than our own;
- Celebrate the dynamic and perpetual re-creation of God's world by nurturing a faithful expression of the arts from children's programs to hosting established artists and fostering musical gifts;
- Create a welcoming spiritual home for people in all stages of life, from young families to singles, empty nesters to senior adults; and
- Advocate for the just treatment of all people by offering tangible assistance and striving for structural change in racial equity, housing and healthcare access, and environmental stewardship.

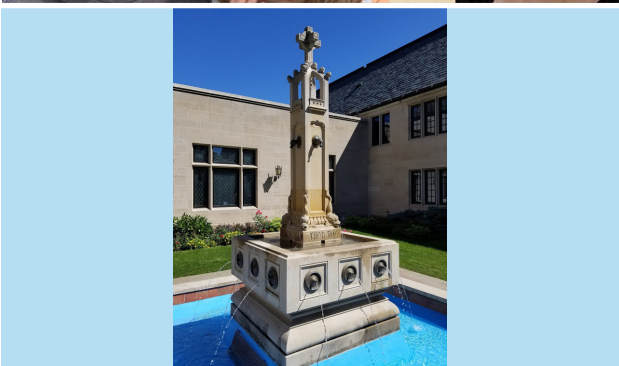
## 7 Objectives
