So we are pleased to announce in addition to reopening for in-person worship on June 6, Session approved at its April meeting "Sanctuary Sundays," which will occur on May 23 and 30. These two worship opportunities will include music and prayer and be open to up to 50 people helping us refine protocols as we seek to offer a safe worship experience and extend hospitality to all who enter 797 Summit Avenue.

For "Sanctuary Sundays" and in-person worship on June 6, the following nine guidelines will be required:

1. Please sign up to attend worship on SignUp Genius. You may also phone the church to make a reservation. You will find this information soon on our website.
2. Please wear a mask at all times.
3. Please physically distance for the safety of everyone attending worship.
4. Every third pew will be open. Please seat yourself, but keep physically distanced from non-family members who are attending worship.
5. All doors to House of Hope will be open to assure a smooth entrance and exit.
6. A deacon or church member will greet you at the door and check you in.
7. A time of fellowship will occur outside on Summit Avenue.
8. Offerings baskets will be placed in the Narthex.
9. Bulletins will be found in the pews.

The Psalmist once wrote, "I was glad when they said unto me, 'Let us go into the house of the Lord.'" Indeed, those words have never rung more true!
