

Genesis tells us that we are created in God's image; that human beings are created from the earth, and given life and breath by God. March Food Drive: Let's Tackle Hunger

Hunger and food insecurity impacts many people in our communities. According to Hunger Solutions Minnesota, the state's 350 food shelves received 3.7 million visits in 2021. The pandemic has increased the need, making our March Food Drive vitally important by supporting Neighborhood House and Hallie Q. Brown Community Center.

We can help the 1 in 8 hungry children, or 1 in 11 people overall. Food insecurity makes children uneasy, stressed, and unable to concentrate. Teachers notice their student's relief receiving groceries at school on Friday, knowing they will have food for the weekend. Parents worry they can't fulfill basic food needs for their family. *How can you help?*

Robyn Sand Anderson, a native of Decorah, Iowa, has a Bachelor of Arts in Fine Art and Art Education from Luther College in Decorah. She has been a professional artist specializing in transparent watercolor and acrylic for over thirty years. After a diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis in 2008, Sand Anderson's paintings changed from representational watercolors to acrylic abstract expressionism. She has found non-objective painting expresses those things that are hard to understand or explain. Her use of bright, vibrant color always moves toward hope. Since her own diagnosis she is especially attuned to those who suffer and hopes to be a visual voice for hope and healing.

Most recently, Robyn has been interpreting choral, orchestral, and eclectic folk music with color, movement, and texture. She is drawn to the power of combining visual art and music. The power of lyric adds another dimension. She finds that she "sees" color when listening to music, which seems to especially inspire her creativity.

Update from the Personnel Committee: Transitional Pastor

The Personnel Committee has completed a Transitional Pastor job description and sent it to the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area.

The Pastor Position Team of the Commission on Ministry of the Presbytery approved the job description at their monthly meeting on February 17. Following this approval, the Pastor Position Team sent out the job description to the approved list of transitional pastors and posted it on the PCUSA Mid-Council website. House of Hope is in the process of posting the job description on church employment sites and in clergy focused publications.

Once a Transitional Pastor is in place we will have a clergy team of Senior Associate Rev. Dr. Julia Carlson and a Transitional Pastor.

Next Steps:

The Transitional Pastor, along with the Session, will lead the congregation in assessing previous work and design additional congregational visioning. The resulting Mission Study will be sent to the Pastor Position Team of the Commission on Ministry of the Presbytery for approval. The process will include consideration of reopening the Transitional Associate Pastor position.

After the approval of the Mission Study, the HOH Session and Nominating Committee will ask the Pastor Position Team to form a Pastor Nominating Committee.

A PNC is then nominated by the Nominating Committee of HOH and elected by the congregation. After the election, they will begin the process to identify the next installed Pastor.
