There is Hope - A Celebration Year of Preaching and Music begins on Palm Sunday weekend, April 9 and 10, 2022



JULIAN, A One Woman Drama by J. Janda, performed by Linda C. Loving Saturday, April 9 | House of Hope Sanctuary | 2 p.m.

Julian of Norwich, a 14th century mystic, was the first known woman to write in English. Her beautiful prose and theology from *Revelations of Divine Love* are brought to

life in this production, along with the medieval times and town of Norwich. Julian lived through 3 bouts of the Plague to proclaim: "All shall be well!" There are many other parallels with our current pandemic times, and the hope and inspiration of this remarkable spiritual guide have become more relevant than ever.

This moving performance by Ms. Loving reminds us of the **Mothering Love of a God who is all-inclusive, all compassion, and all forgiving**, and it shows us the courage and profound faith of a woman ahead of her time whose words may well be intended for our time.

Rev. Linda C. Loving has performed JULIAN nearly 100 times around the country in the past 33 years, bringing to life the wisdom, hope, and profound writings of the 14th

century mystic. Forty HOH women traveled to England with Linda in 2001 to view her performance there, and in 2006 Linda produced a DVD of this drama in Julian's cell. In recent years she has also been cast with professional theatre companies in the Midwest and Santa Fe, New Mexico where she now resides. After breast cancer treatment in 2010, she wrote *A New Song to Sing: Breast Cancer as Journey of Spirit*, a workbook intended to support groups of women survivors. Rev. A Note from Julia



I love being your pastor! Thank you for calling me to the position almost eight years ago and for calling on me to minister as needs arose.

And I am in need of rest and refreshment. The Session approved a sabbatical for me last November, and it was agreed that I would be gone from April 19-July 10, 2022. The Personnel Committee together with the Presbytery believe it is important to stay with this plan even with the unexpected transition. In addition to your strong and wonderful HOH Staff, there will be a Sabbatical Pastor here while I am away for any clergy and leadership needs if the Transitional Pastor has not yet been identified. And you have seen in this issue of The Anchor that we are beginning a year-long celebration of preaching and music beginning on Palm Sunday. Our worship life will be as strong as ever!

Personnel Committee Update:

A subcommittee within the Personnel Committee has begun interviewing candidates for the Transitional Pastor position in coordination with our Presbytery representative, Rev. Denise Dunbar-Perkins. Once a candidate or candidates are identified, others, including Rev. Dr. Julia Carlson and/or other staff will also be invited to interview the candidate(s). Once a Transitional Pastor is in place, we will have a clergy team of Senior Associate Pastor Rev. Dr. Julia Carlson and a Transitional Pastor.

We are also working to address the possibility that we may not have a Transitional Pastor in place before Dr. Carlson goes on her well-deserved sabbatical. Specifically, Julia is being supported by the Presbytery Commission on Ministry (COM) to identify potential Sabbatical Pastors. During my sabbatical, I have made plans to visit some of Britain's great cathedrals to enjoy the beauty of their space and see what they can teach us about living deeply into the Christian faith in a more secular world. And some indigenous sites are on the itinerary as they are still sources for some of the spirituality that is rising around us. I look forward to sharing my experiences when I return. After about five weeks of international travel that begins with a hermitage stay in Ireland, I will also have time to visit with family and friends around Minnesota and in Kansas. Thank you for this time away!

Meanwhile, I look forward to seeing Linda Loving revive *Julian* on April 9 in the sanctuary and hearing her preach on Palm Sunday. In this time we should remember Julian's words, "All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well... for there is a force of love moving through the universe that holds us fast and will never let us go."

Abstract Expressionist Paintings by Robyn Sand Anderson

Through May 1

Robyn Sand Anderson was originally "a lover of representational watercolors" Sand Anderson found her way to abstract expressionism after a diagnosis of rheumatoid arthritis in 2008. Abstract expressionism opened up a new world for her; one in which color, movement, and texture helped her work through what she couldn't find words to express. Her use of bright, vibrant color always moves toward hope.

In 2018 she received a grant to visit Norway, the home of Edvard Grieg, to study his music, his life, and the environment that colored his compositions.

I've found a home interpreting music with paint. It's funny how unexpected gifts can rise out of terrible things. I feel like this way of painting lifted me out of a dark place. I am grateful. Once troubled by the breadth of my styles, I now embrace it as a gift and love variety. I never get bored. With the return of good health, I treasure my ability to paint every day.



Session Update: HVAC/ Electrical Systems

At its March 15 meeting, the Session voted to proceed with the replacement of our Electrical/HVAC system.

We are doing this work for the preservation of the building and the safety of all within it. We are the stewards of amazing stained glass windows, "narratives of colour" as John O'Donohue puts it, "a beautiful house where the divine presence could trust itself among us." Our hearts, minds, and spirits have been nurtured in this space and our building continues to offer tremendous potential for new and future ministries. And as the Director of the Choir School said, "We want to be able to pass this building on to our children's grandchildren."

Here's a recap of our process over the last five years.

- In 2018, the House, Property and Insurance Committee asked the Session to move ahead with replacing the HVAC system.
- In 2019, HOH contracted with the Pegasus Group to get the support of an Owner's Representative to guide us through the project.
- In 2020, with the help of our Owner's Representative Eric Kruse, mechanical, electrical, and structural engineers, along with architects and designers went through the building to determine the best replacement plan. At this time, it was found that 15 of 21 electrical panels were in need
