Over its first 40 years, under the guidance of 8 directors, with Orff and voice instructors, parent and pastoral volunteers, The Choir School's mission has been to give all children a positive singing and musical experience.

Through its commitment to the fine arts

and education, the members of HOH have made it possible for all children in the Twin Cities to have the opportunity to sing and learn together in this unique music program.

Everyone has musical potential as well as the ability to learn! Children enjoy challenges and delight in mastering new skills which lead to new goals, new accomplishments, and new confidence. The Choir School creates a welcoming space for all children to explore their individual voices while working to create beauty together. Choristers sing our Christian faith, build friendships that can last a lifetime, and actively participate in the HOH community. Choristers grow to understand the difference between singing for worship and singing for performance, both excellent, but singular experiences. And choristers learn the depths of singing, first by rote, then adding additional layers of understanding through note reading, sight-singing; seeing and hearing the patterns that make music so powerful.

Singing in foreign languages allows the singer to experience other cultures and traditions and singing music throughout history allows our choristers to travel through time.

Band and orchestra are terrific experiences for young musicians, but singing is something distinct. The human voice is an incredible instrument. We don't have to buy or rent it, we ARE it! We are the instrument, each with a sound that is entirely unique. I hope that next time you're in church, you will raise your voice to God's glory while singing a hymn, turn your attention to the sounds of the anthem, and whether it's a child, grandchild, neighbor, or friend, encourage them to try The House of Hope Choir School this fall. All voices are welcome here!

Throughout this 40th anniversary season, the Choir School will be singing favorite anthems in worship and inviting our alumni from 1982-2022 to join us in song and celebration!

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
