Rev. Dr. Robin Steinke September 25

The Rev. Dr. Robin J. Steinke came to

Luther Seminary as president and professor of systematic theology in June 2014. She was the first woman in the 145-year history of the seminary to be elected president. A native of California, with formative years spent in rural southwestern Minnesota, Steinke completed undergraduate study at Augustana University in Sioux Falls, majoring in music education. She was a middle school band director before working in financial planning with American Express. Study followed at Emory University, Luther Seminary,

and finally at Trinity Lutheran Seminary in Ohio, where she obtained masters degrees in Divinity and Sacred Theology before completing her doctorate at Cambridge University in 1999. That same year she was ordained as an associate pastor at Hope Lutheran Church in Annandale, Virginia and joined the faculty at Lutheran Theological Seminary at Gettysburg and as Dean of the Seminary. Steinke is known for her strategic leadership, passion for sharing the gospel, and commitment to the global church.

A Note from Scott

New Beginnings

At the time of this writing, I have been working at House of Hope for ten days. My

office is now situated (for the most part), I have learned the names of most staff members, I have begun to understand the organizational structure of the church, I have learned more about the recent history of the church, and I have had many conversations with people about the HVAC system!

This is the beginning of my fifth "Tall Steeple" Interim/Transitional pastorate since 2014—and all of them have been unique and interesting. For example, in New York City, at Fort Washington Collegiate Church, I arrived in the middle of a twelve million dollar building renovation project. Their former Senior Minister had just retired due to health reasons, and there had been significant turnover in church staff in the preceding months. People in the congregation were feeling rather "unsettled" and there was a lot of anxiety about the future. But with patience, open discussion, and good planning, the renovation project was completed, the church staff was replenished with talented people, and eventually a gifted pastor was called to be the new Senior Minister, and she is now in her fifth year of a very fruitful ministry.

In a similar way, in Davidson, North Carolina, (a suburb of Charlotte), at the Davidson College Presbyterian Church, when I arrived, I discovered that their HVAC system was on its last legs, and they were still trying to retire the debt on a new Fellowship Hall that had been constructed ten years earlier. In fact, the HVAC system was in such poor condition that it had become almost impossible to regulate humidity levels in the sanctuary, and it was beginning to cause damage to one of the best organs in the southeastern United States (plaster and paint in the sanctuary was also cracking and peeling). Again, there was much anxiety in the congregation about their ability to meet this challenge, so we

fostered a lot of discussion, consensus building, strategizing, and dreaming. Other capital and mission needs were included in the developing project. And by the time a new Senior Pastor had arrived, the stage had already been set to begin and complete the project--and to pay for it.

So, as we begin our work together, my advice is for all of us to take a collective "deep breath" and to trust that God is present and at work among us. Let us take time to discern where the Spirit is moving so that we can perceive where God is leading us and what we are being called to in this new day. Together, we will encourage and support the church staff, provide for the ongoing worship and programmatic life of the congregation (mission, education, stewardship, spiritual development, and fellowship), figure out this HVAC situation, and get the church ready to call and install a new Lead Pastor.

Contemporary Quilts Mary Mathews September 11 – October 9

Born and raised on Minnesota's Iron Range, Mary Mathews received a degree in Textiles and Clothing Merchandising from Iowa State University. Years as an educator and fabric store owner ignited her commitment to supporting and empowering artists and entrepreneurs as Co-Founder and CEO of the Entrepreneur Fund.

In 2000, she made her first quilt—a log cabin crazy quilt—and she was hooked. From initially relying on quilt patterns to trusting improvisation and her own creative sense, she has come full circle—her love of sewing, color, texture, and design resulting in her "second career" as an artist. Her work has been shown in numerous regional art shows, and she received the 2021 Northern Lights Juried International Art Exhibition, Award of Excellence.

Through my designs, that emerge organically, I explore value, repetition, and contrast. I might start with an idea or concept inspired by nature, media, found objects, or the textiles themselves. Using a rotary cutter in lieu of pencil, I create lines and shapes as I go, trusting myself, what is emerging, and my own attraction to order, while also welcoming the liberation of lines that aren't straight and seams that don't match.

Earth Care Quit Plastics



1,000,000,000,000 Plastic Bags Are Used Worldwide Every Year

Plastic bags can take up to 20 years to break down. The first step to reduce the amount of single-use plastic is to understand how much we consume. Note the amount of plastic you dispose of daily for an honest assessment of your consumption and for clues to how you can make the most impact. Begin with the actions below. Then work your way up to what more you can do.

- Bring your own reusable bags and refuse plastic ones. Each reusable bag could cancel out hundreds and even thousands of plastic bags.
- Use mesh cloth bags for your produce, and try to avoid fruits and vegetables packed in plastic wrap and clamshells.



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
