Gail Irwin, who has served as an Interim Pastor in UCC and

PCUSA congregations in Wisconsin, reflected on her experience as an Interim Pastor in The Christian Century back in 2014:

An interim ministry position is a funny gig. The Interim is not called but hired. They are not installed, not permanent.... I knew early on that interim work is viewed as a second-tier career track when a guy at a nursing home said, "You are a surprisingly good preacher. I bet you could be a real minister." I did not bother to tell him I have been a "real minister" for 25 years.

We often lovingly compile data that our successors do not pay attention to. We learn that we will not be able to change much about the churches we serve, and we must sit on our hands and bite our tongues when it comes to being "change agents," because there is only so much you can do in a year or two.

One of the most misunderstood things about interims is that we are not "placeholders" who simply keep the congregation treading water until the new person comes along. We have a unique perspective as the outsider sent in to engender trust quickly and help a group of people do some hard soul-searching that they usually do not want to do. Like a family counselor.

She continued: I like to see congregations ask interim questions like these:

- How has the makeup of our congregation changed in the last five to ten years?
- How have our community demographics changed?
- What church programming has become outdated or ill-suited to who we are now?
- Where is our revenue coming from, and where will it be coming from in five years?
- What happens in our church when we

try doing something new, or doing something old in a new way?

• And the all-purpose transition question: What is God leading us to do and be in this time and place?

I am very aware that much good reflection has been done on some of these questions and others in a Mission Study that was completed just a few years ago under a previous Interim Pastor and that additional Long-Range Planning was done even more recently.

So, we will not be trying to re-invent the wheel on some of this stuff. We will, however, revisit some of this material to see "what still rings true post-pandemic" and make every effort to include as many people in the congregation as possible to develop a workable, realistic (yet ambitious) plan going forward. [And then elect a Pastor Nominating Committee to find a pastor who has the gifts, skills, and emotional and spiritual maturity to help make it a reality].

I have learned over the years that lasting, positive change in congregations only takes place when it is deeply rooted in the ethos and values of a congregation, and it has broad-based support within the congregation itself—from the ground up.

So, look for opportunities this fall to join with others to talk about the future of House of Hope Presbyterian Church.

I have also learned that when the "up front" research and planning stage is done well that it makes the search for a new pastor go much more quickly because the Pastor Nominating Committee has a great deal of clarity as to what to look for in potential candidates.

I look forward to collaborating with you in the coming months as the possibilities for future mission and ministry at HOH take on sharper focus.

21–34 Billion Plastic Beverage Bottles End Up in the Ocean Each Year

Only a fraction of plastic is actually recycled – 8.7% in the U.S., according to most recent estimates. Begin with these actions to reduce your use of plastic beverage containers.

- Carry a reusable water bottle and refill it with tap water. Using a reusable water bottle instead of buying and recycling water bottles could reduce your global warming impact by as much as 98 percent.
- Don't buy drinks in plastic bottles. Switch from buying your soda in plastic bottles to buying it in cans.
