A Note from Julia

We were buried with Christ through baptism into death in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, we too may live a new life. —Romans 6:4

In centuries past, it was the practice on the day before Ash Wednesday to be "shriven," to confess, be given penance, and then absolved of sin, so the day became known as Shrove Tuesday. We now know it as Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday. Because the season of Lent is one of introspection and abstinence, the larders were cleared of butter and cream by serving pancakes and other rich foods before the forty days of simple foods and fasting. More recently, the practice of giving up something valued or adding some kind of service have been more common.

Many things changed with the pandemic and my approach to Lent is one of them. I have said it before and share it again here, I think of the three years of COVID-19 as a long Lenten season. We had relationship fasts; watching grandchildren grow on a virtual Zoom call was both a gift and a heartache. We had to hope our smiles reached our eyes while wearing masks. We all have pandemic related losses and readjustments.

So what shall we do for Lent in 2023? For one thing, please take note of the **Building the Beloved Community** and make plans to join us for soup, learning, and discussion. It is a good time to think about healing the sin of racism in our culture.

And our Lent will be a time of compression. The long-awaited HVAC/ electrical project begins with asbestos abatement in early April. In order to prepare for that, there will be many moves taking place in March as those with East Wing offices and programs relocate to the Parish House. Our Sunday School and Choir School will begin to meet in new spaces. By Easter, we are going to party like it's ... 1914. All of our activities and gatherings this spring and possibly into November, will take place in something quite close to our original footprint.

For Lent 2023, I believe it is important to claim the promise of Easter which infuses everything, including the Lenten journey. We are moving into an extensive construction project at the same time we are visioning for the future of our communal life. God is calling us to new possibilities and our cup of potentials for ministry through worship and music, as well as building and property use, are overflowing! Through it all, we are living the great mystery of our faith: *Christ has died. Christ is risen, Christ will come again.*

House of Hope HVAC/Electrical Project Begins



House of Hope has been working toward a major construction project to update the HVAC, electrical panels, and other work under the direction of the Utility Infrastructure Task Force created by the HOH Session.

There are two asbestos abatement projects scheduled prior to the beginning of Phase 1 of the Electrical/ HVAC project: asbestos containment under the sanctuary February 27-March 9; and asbestos abatement in the East Wing April 10-30. In preparation for this work, areas of the church have been or are being emptied, programs moved and items being packed and stored. The Kirk Parlour and East Wing will be closed beginning Monday, March 20. Affected areas are shaded with blue and yellow highlight in the image above. Blue areas indicate storage, and yellow areas indicate construction.

Here are some of the changes you can expect during abatement and Phase 1.

- Sunday School will be in the Assembly Room.
- Portland Door Coat Room will be used for choir robes and folders.
- HOH art will be packed and stored off-site throughout the project.
- The Library will be used for Choir School Wednesday and Sunday rehearsals.
- Centering Prayer will be in the sanctuary chancel.
- On weekdays, the Library will be a swing space for a variety of meetings and gatherings.
- Session and Deacons will meet in the Assembly Room.
- Adult Enrichment and The Didier Seminar will be in the sanctuary.
- Sunday Coffee and Fellowship will be in the Cloister Gallery Hallway.
- The Motet Choir will practice in the sanctuary.

- The Singers office will move to an upper level Assembly Room office
- Other staff office moves are TBD.

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 The sanctuary will be available throughout the project except on March 5 -- see page one for details.

For other meetings and events, we have five meeting spaces available: library, Kirby Lounge, Skylight Room, sanctuary, and Assembly Room. Otherwise, meetings can be held on Zoom, or at an alternate location (home, coffee shop, etc.) With limited space available, please plan in advance for meetings and events, and contact the church to be added to the calendar.

Extensive planning has taken place for this construction project by House of Hope staff, and we will continue to adapt as needed and keep you informed.

Session Highlights

The Session met on January 17.

Rev. Dr. Scott Kenefake noted increasing attendance at worship over the initial six months of his service. He noted also that financial performance improved at the end of 2022, and the 2023 Stewardship Campaign is off to a good start.

The Budget Committee presented the 2023 balanced budget proposal. An increase in non-pledged revenue balances a decrease in pledge revenue. \$100,000 of non-pledged revenue was received in December 2022. There is an increase in salaries, benefits and allowances due to new staff hires and rises in benefits costs. Other expenses are flat. Session approved the 2023 budget.

Personnel Committee noted the hiring of four new employees, and Session approved elevating Rev. Dr. Carlson's title to Senior Associate Pastor.

New Testament Images Kirsten Malcolm Berry March 12 – April 9

Adult Enrichment Sunday, March 26

"My work is drawn from the images of the New Testament. Integrated into each painting is the verse on which it is based, written in Greek. The Greek links viewers to the original form of the text and its unfamiliar script hints at God's global grace to "every tribe and language."

The configurations of repeated shapes reflect the influence of several indigenous art forms. The daughter of Presbyterian missionaries, I grew up in the Philippines and was exposed to the decorative use of patterns on Filipino and other Southeast Asian fabrics and basketry. Geometric woolen tapestries of my Scandinavian heritage have also affected my sense of design, as have Native American weaving, Hmong reverse appliqué, traditional quilts, and Byzantine mosaics.

The exercise of faith is difficult for those of us who long for perceptible signs of God's presence. I paint the images of the Bible to help me translate the abstract into the tangible. Through pictures I grasp that the Word indeed became flesh, and in resurrection power is present even now in the Advocate. And is that not him behind the glimmers of new creation we see each day?"
