President and CEO of Interfaith Alliance, Rev. Paul Raushenbush served as Senior Vice President at Auburn Seminary, Executive Editor of HuffPost Religion, and Associate Dean of Religious Life and The Chapel at Princeton University. Most recently, he was Senior Advisor for Public Affairs and Innovation at Interfaith America.

An ordained Baptist minister, Rev. Raushenbush has been a leader in the interfaith movement to protect freedom and preserve democracy. He comes from a dual line of pioneers in the very work he has been called to do. As the great-grandson of the first Jewish Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis and greatgrandson of Baptist theologian Walter Rauschenbusch, a key figure in the Social Gospel movement, Rev. Paul Raushenbush's commitment to interfaith advocacy comes in part from his own interfaith background.

For me, the Motet Choir's involvement in Holy Week services in one of my favorite parts of the year. Having experienced this poignant week of the church vear in other faith traditions, my wish is that more of us attended services here, finding time for reflection and prayer in the midst of our own busy lives. The services crafted for you by our church staff offer scripture, music, and meditations that may present to you new meaning and insights into the context and relevance of Christ's crucifixion and resurrection in today's world. In order to help play our part in this, the Motet Choir will be singing works from a number of musical traditions, portraying the events of Palm Sunday through the triumph of Easter morning.

Palm Sunday

We share the celebration of Jesus' arrival with a setting of the spiritual, *Ride On*, *King Jesus*, crafted by Larry Fleming. Later in the service, we will sing Gilbert Martin's famous setting of *When I Survey the Wondrous Cross*, the third stanza of which is printed above. I've intentionally put this piece a week or two earlier than where I might otherwise program it, allowing a foretaste of Christ on the cross, where both love and sorrow flow.

Maundy Thursday

One of House of Hope's longest-running musical traditions is the sharing of Healey Willan's *Tenebrae Responses*, sung juxtaposed with the spoken scriptures. These four responses are part of a larger set, and are created in the same way

As a noun, retreat is a process of receding, to pull back the troops, or to seek refuge. To *make* a retreat is to withdraw to a spiritual place. All women are invited for a weekend away from daily routines to re-connect and deepen our relationship with God, the earth, ourselves, and others.
