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SUNDAY SERIES George Takei Sunday, September 17 | 2 p.m.



George Takei is known around the world for his role in the acclaimed original TV series *Star Trek*, in which he played Hikaru Sulu, helmsman of the starship *Enterprise*. But, Takei's story includes an acting career that spans six decades. From a childhood spent with his family wrongfully imprisoned in Japanese American internment camps during World War II to becoming one of the country's leading figures in the fight for social justice, LGBTQ+ rights, and marriage equality, Takei remains a powerful voice on issues ranging from politics to pop culture.

His rich baritone voice has provided narration for the PBS series *The National Parks: America's Best Idea*, the Peabody Award-winning radio documentary *Crossing East*, and *Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home*, which garnered Takei a Grammy Award nomination for Best Spoken Word Album. In 2015, Takei made his Broadway debut in the musical *Allegiance*, which was inspired by his true-life experiences during World War II. In 2017, he starred in a revival of Stephen Sondheim's *Pacific Overtures* in New York City.

Takei is the author of four books, including an autobiography *To the Stars*. His most recent book, the *New York Times* best-selling graphic memoir *They Called Us Enemy*, was released in July 2019.

A Note from Scott

The Power of Relationships

"Back in the day" when church going culture was stronger in the United States than it is now, it was common to describe congregations as "program" churches or "pastor-centered" churches. Program churches, generally, were larger churches with lots of staff that ran lots of programs for various age groups within the congregation. This model worked well for many larger churches well into the 1990's and early 2000's [it still works in parts of the Bible Belt] but has become more difficult to sustain as congregations have aged and fewer young people are "showing up."

Conversely, pastor-centered churches were those small to mid-sized congregations who couldn't afford program staff and were dependent on the initiative of the pastor and volunteers to sustain worship, educational, and fellowship programs. These churches have become even more pastor-centered in recent decades as volunteers have become harder to find and congregations have aged.

We are now, however, in a new era of church life that I like to call the "relationship building era." As churches have moved from the center of American life (in the post-World War II era) to the periphery (in the last generation or two) we have the new task of introducing ourselves [or reintroducing ourselves again for the first time—to use the language of the late, Marcus Borg] to people who know little or nothing about who we are or what we do.

So, our challenge is not (in most cases) overcoming hostility from people, but indifference. We are not even on the radar screens of large segments of contemporary American society.

How can we address this? By getting to know our neighbors better.

Case in point: we have been hosting National Night Out on the first Tuesday in August for a number of years now. This year, about 400 people from the neighborhoods around the church attended the event and the striking thing about the participants was how young they were—lots of families with children. Although most of these people live in the neighborhoods on the Portland side of our campus, the demographics in the neighborhoods south of Summit are the same.

Events like these do a lot to create a greater sense of community and trust among people who live in the neighborhoods around the church, and they also nurture a positive relationship between the congregation and our neighbors. And that's a good thing. They break down barriers and communicate that we are a vital part of the community and contribute to its welfare.

Programs, of course, continue to be an important part of church life in congregations like House of Hope, but increasingly we need to be asking ourselves, What do our neighbors need? What's important to them? How can we be in relationship/partnership with them?

All of the visioning work we have done together over the past year, as well as the development of the Master Site Plan has been done with these questions in mind. Stay tuned: this fall we'll be rolling out some new ministry ideas that will help us to strengthen community/ relationship ties within the congregation and enable us to better connect with the people around us. It's a holistic approach that includes everything from how the building and grounds are used, to adding new (and revising existing) programming, to developing new ways to connect with neighbors near and far.

It's an exciting time to be a part of HOH, and we are grateful for the many people within (and outside!) the congregation who have been working hard on all of this.
