HOH Welcomes New Staff Members



Dr. Jimmy Hoke joined the HOH staff as Director of Children and Family Ministry. Jimmy has a PhD, with distinction, in Biblical Studies with

Certification in Women/Gender Studies from Drew University, an MDiv from The University of Chicago, and a BA in Religion, Women/Gender Studies from Furman University.

Most recently, Jimmy has been an Adjunct Faculty member at United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities. He formerly served as Director of Educational Ministries at Presbyterian Church of Madison, Madison, NJ. In this position, he led a team of parents and church staff to craft a vision for educational programming that best met the needs of the children and youth; designed weekly Bible-based curricula for K-12 youth; trained and prepared volunteer instructors; planned community-building events for children, youth, and families; assisted in teaching confirmation classes; and worked with the Mission and Worship committees to provide opportunities for service and worship leadership for children and youth.



Rev. Philip Romine will join the HOH staff on December 10 as Transitional Associate Pastor for Faith Formation

and Lifelong Learning. Phil has worked in congregations, academia, and community nonprofits for more than 15 years. He earned both MDiv and MA degrees with honors from United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities. Phil learned much from the youth, children, and families in his support roles at Central Presbyterian Church and Valley Community Presbyterian Church, completed transitional ministry training, and spent 2020-2023 as a member of the writing and task force team for the Presbytery's Institutional Race and Equity Self-Assessment. His work at Interfaith Action of Greater Saint Paul encompassed guest preaching, adult education, community meetings, event planning, and program management. But the greatest learning experiences of his life have been becoming a parent to his young children, Hugo and Georgiana Stoneburg, and a partner to Elizabeth Stoneburg.

Lilly Endowment Grant Update

Many of you know that we applied for a \$1.25 million grant this past June from the Lilly Endowment to partially fund and a develop what we have been calling the Center for Music, Spirituality, and the Arts. This is an umbrella term for a number of new ministry initiatives that would enable HOH to hire some new staff and develop new outreach programming in the areas of music, spirituality (faith formation), and the arts. We were notified recently that we were not selected to receive a grant this year (there were more than 800 applications and about 100 received awards). This, however, was a good learning experience for us and we plan to "fine tune" and refine our application so that we will be better positioned to receive a future grant when the next application period is announced. Retired Minnesota Supreme Court Justice Alan C. Page Sunday, January 14 | 2 p.m.

Justice Alan Page received his BA in political science from the University of Notre Dame in 1967 and his JD from the University of Minnesota Law School in 1978 while playing

for the Minnesota Vikings. After retiring from the NFL in 1981, Justice Page practiced law full-time before winning a seat on the Minnesota Supreme Court in 1992, becoming the first African American on the court. Page and his late wife Diane founded the Page Education Foundation assisting Minnesota students of color pursuing post-secondary education, awarding \$16 million to date to more than 8,000 students. *Register on our website beginning Thursday, December 14.*

October Session Highlights

The Session approved two recommendations from the Neill Task Force.

1. Adoption of the following statement:

We are grateful to Reverend Dr. Edward Duffield Neill for his contributions in founding House of Hope. However, his views regarding indigenous people on whose ancestral land our church and city now stand were deeply troubling and, in some cases, expressed in ways we now find abhorrent. With humility we know that we too are flawed in ways apparent now and others that time will tell. Still, we are called to discern and act to the best of our understanding and to recognize where we have harmed or where we have benefited from others' harmful acts. Given what we have come to understand about Rev. Dr. Neill we are called to recognize the harm done and to work toward wholeness and understanding and righting those harms.

The House of Hope Presbyterian Church is not defined by our founder, yet we recognize our complicity with the past. Therefore, we wish to state: • We believe all persons are of equal value, dignity, integrity, and respect. • We believe Black and Brown lives matter to God and to us. • We believe in the freedom and integrity of the LGBTQ+ Community and are a Covenant Network Church of the PCUSA.

• We believe we are stewards of the Earth and are an Earth Care Congregation of the PCUSA 2. We recommend that the Neill Wing, now more commonly called the Education Wing be renamed the East Wing.

The Session will have further discussion regarding other aspects of the report and keep the congregation informed.

In Terra Pax by Gerald Finzi: Special Music for 7 p.m. Christmas Eve Service



A series of tragedies profoundly affected Finzi in his early years. By the time he was eighteen he had lost his father, three elder brothers and his much-loved music teacher, killed in action. This dreadful sequence of events, and the appalling losses of the First World War that formed the backdrop to his adolescence, gave Finzi an acute awareness of the impermanence of life, confirmed with grim finality when at the age of fifty he discovered that he was dying of leukemia. These experiences to a large extent account for the hint of

melancholy underlying much of his music.

Finzi's musical inspiration sprang primarily from his love of literature and the English countryside - the same sources that inspired Elgar and Vaughan Williams. *In Terra Pax* was composed in 1954 and was almost the last piece that Finzi wrote, though its genesis can be traced to an event some thirty years previously, when one Christmas Eve he had climbed up to the church at the top of his beloved Chosen Hill, between Gloucester and Cheltenham. The sound of the midnight bells ringing out across the frosty Gloucestershire valleys evidently made a lasting impression on him, retrospectively providing the idea for *In Terra Pax*, as he told Vaughan Williams. — An excerpt of a program note by John Bawden - used by kind permission Read the entire program note at https://bit.ly/HOHInTerraPax

David Johnson: Carillonneur Emeritus



Dave Johnson retired on October 31 having served as Carillonneur for House of Hope for 30 years. In worship on November 5, HOH Director of Music and Organist Aaron Miller shared that Dave is one of the most recognized carillonneurs in the country having commissioned new pieces, taught new carillonneurs and helped them with the certification process, and been an advocate for carillons across the country. For his achievements House of Hope conferred upon David Johnson the title of Carillonneur Emeritus. He was presented with a plague and a plague in his honor will be added to other plagues of noted musicians at HOH.

HVAC//Electrical Project Transitions to Phase 2

Major changes are ahead for HOH as we upgrade our HVAC and electrical infrastructure. Earlier this year, we vacated the eastern part of the property as Terra Construction and other contractors began their work. Planning is underway to vacate the western part of the building and move church staff offices and operations to the East Wing. We will regain use of the Kirk Parlour, Chapel, Great Hall, and Rooms A & B. We will not have access to the Kirby Lounge, Assembly Room, Library and church office. Watch for updates in the Enews.

In order to prepare for and navigate the process of moving, the church building will be closed and open as follows in January:

January 3 - 6: Closed to pack January 7: Open for worship January 8 - 10: Closed for set-up; open for AA and Al Anon January 11: Open



The new boilers began operation in November to heat the East Wing (the boilers can be seen with green panels illuminated in the center of the photo and are centrally located in the tunnel). Work is in process to replace the air handlers under the sanctuary, and then the new boilers will heat that space in the coming weeks.
