

House of Hope welcomes Justice Alan C. Page to our Sunday Series. Alan Page was born on August 7, 1945, in Canton, Ohio. He graduated from Canton Central Catholic High School in 1963, received his B.A. in political science from the University of Notre Dame in 1967, and received his J.D. from the University of Minnesota Law School in 1978.

After graduating from law school, Alan Page worked as an attorney for a law firm in Minneapolis, then served seven years as an attorney in the office of the Minnesota Attorney General.

He sought election to the Minnesota Supreme Court in 1992 and won, becoming the first African American on the court and one of the few associate justices ever to join the court initially through election, rather than appointment by the governor. When Justice Page was reelected in 1998, he became the biggest vote-getter in Minnesota history. He was reelected in 2004 and 2010 and served until he reached the mandatory retirement age of 70 in 2015.

Law was Alan Page's second career; he was first known for his skills in football both in college and in the NFL. At Notre Dame, Alan Page led the school's storied football program to the 1966 national championship, and in 1993 he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Alan Page was a first-round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings in 1967, and he played for the Vikings until 1978. The last three years of his football career were with the Chicago Bears, 1978-1981. During his career, Alan Page played in 218 consecutive games, earning All-Pro honors six times, and was voted to nine consecutive Pro Bowls. In 1971 he was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player, becoming only the second defensive player in history to be named MVP. In 1988 he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and in 2019 he was chosen as a member of the NFL's 100th Anniversary All-Time Team.

Also in 1988, Alan Page and his wife Diane founded the Page Education Foundation, which assists Minnesota students of color in their pursuit of post-secondary education. To date, the foundation has awarded \$16 million in grants to more than 8,000 students.

In June 2017, after a campaign initiated by students at Alexander Ramsey Middle School in Minneapolis, the school's name was changed to *Justice Page Middle School*. An elementary school named *Justice Alan Page Elementary School* opened last year in Maplewood, Minnesota.

In November 2018, Justice Page received the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Justice Page and his daughter, Kamie Page, have written four children's picture books, Alan and His Perfectly Pointy Impossibly Perpendicular Pinky (2013), The Invisible You (2014), Grandpa Alan's Sugar Shack (2017), and Bee Love (Can Be Hard) (2020).

Sacred Bells, a new handbell ensemble, was formed in October 2023 and participated in worship on

A Note from Scott

Extravagant Welcome

Have you ever wondered if people who visit House of Hope feel welcome? I've heard stories from people that range from, "Everyone was so friendly," to "Nobody said a word to me," to everything in between. And they are likely all true. It's a fact that Upper Midwestern culture can be a bit introverted. As an example, House of Hope is the only church I have served in 37 years of ministry that does not have a time in the worship service for people to greet one another. And lots of people like it that way!

Cameron Trimble, a church consultant with *Convergence*, says:

"As we work with churches around the country, of all sizes and demographic makeups, in rural, urban, and suburban settings, we find that two factors make all the difference in whether or not a church can truly incorporate new people into the life of the church. Churches that are ready for the new energy of new people excel in both welcome and change.

In a 2023 study done by Lifeway Research on people who have switched churches in recent years, participants reported that when visiting churches, 56% felt personally welcomed by other congregants, and 48% felt personally welcomed by pastors or ministers. 79% said that their experience of welcome impacted their decision to continue attending.

However, things are not as overwhelmingly positive when asked about specific essentials to welcoming newcomers. Only 67% of survey respondents reported that when new people are present in worship, they make it a point to speak to them. There may need to be more universal engagement with new people for newcomers to feel welcome.

Additionally, 74% said their church loves the enthusiasm of people with new ideas. However, when we drill down a little further, we find that the ability of the church to welcome those new ideas is weaker in practice."

Anna Golladay said: "I've noticed that a lot of churches advertise that everyone is welcome in their communities. They

say that they are a place for all. Anyone and everyone is welcome to come in their doors. 'Come just as you are,' they proudly pronounce. 'We love everyone."

On some level, I'm sure they mean it. But in practice, most churches fall short. The example of Jesus is helpful here:

Self-righteous religious people? *Jesus welcomed them.*

Adulterous men and women? *Jesus welcomed them.*

The outcast and marginalized? *Jesus welcomed them.*

The differently abled? Jesus welcomed them

Poor people? *Jesus welcomed them.*People from different racial, ethic, political, and theological backgrounds? *Jesus welcomed them.*

Crying babies? Jesus welcomed them.

So, churches need to be really careful that when they advertise a hospitable culture and a welcoming atmosphere, they are not actually lying.

A case in point: a recent visitor (who is gay) worshipped at our church, and said: "I didn't feel unwelcome, but there was nothing communicated in the worship service or in the bulletin or at the entrance (rainbow flag) that I was welcome, even though you say that you are open and affirming on your website."

Ouch. It's true, we have a lot of people who go out of their way to be welcoming and friendly to everyone they meet on Sunday mornings—and that's good. And thank you for that. But let's commit ourselves in 2024 to be more intentional in our welcome with:

- Better messaging
- Better directional signage
- More acceptance of small children
- More thoughtful, intentional engagement with people we don't know

And who knows, maybe somewhere down the line it will dawn us that greeting one another in worship might actually be a good thing.

HVAC//Electrical Project Transitions to Phase 2

Major changes are ahead for HOH as we continue our HVAC and electrical upgrades. In 2023 we vacated the eastern part of the property. In January, we will vacate the western part of the building and move church staff offices and operations to the East Wing. We will regain use of the Kirk Parlour, Chapel, Great Hall, and Rooms A & B. We will not have access to the Kirby Lounge, Assembly Room, Library and church office. In order to prepare for and navigate the process of moving, the church building will be closed and open as follows:
