A Note from Scott

Take a Deep Breath

At long last the Capital Campaign for the HVAC project is under way (*Bright Hope for Tomorrow*)! A brochure with specific details about the campaign will be mailed to members and friends of the congregation in the next week.

I won't rehash the details here, but I do want to talk about the campaign within the framework of the church's larger mission. Our buildings and campus grounds are our primary tools for ministry and outreach in our community: it's where we gather for worship, education, fellowship, and service; it's where we invite people in the community to attend concerts, hear notable speakers, and provide space for neighborhood and community groups.

But most importantly, it's where the gospel is preached, and disciples are made. House of Hope is a large church with a large, inclusive vision. Lives are impacted and changed for the better. Friendships are made and sustained over decades.

Spending time in our neo-gothic spaces can be awe-inspiring, life-giving, and can even be transformational. They truly are gifts of beauty and uplift that have endured over time.

And the new HVAC system—the heating and cooling and electrical systems—are an integral part of these ministry tools: they will enable the buildings to be used in comfort in all seasons; they will reduce our carbon footprint dramatically because they are much more energy efficient; and they are a form of hospitality in the sense that parishioners and community members can gather together in comfort and safety—for decades to come.

Rev. Dr. David Van Dyke, former Pastor of HOH, perhaps said it best: "We worship here, and we're called from this sacred spot to serve the world. It's our privilege to maintain the gift we've received, and it's our duty to hand it on, with pride, to the next generation."

In a similar way, Lynn Twist, author of the book, *Soul of Money*, writes: "Money is like water. It can be a conduit for commitment, a currency of love. Money moving in the direction of our highest commitments nourishes our world and ourselves. What you appreciate appreciates. When you make a difference with what you have, it expands. Collaboration creates prosperity.... Money carries our intention. If we use it with integrity, then it carries integrity forward."

In other words, when money begins to flow in our giving, with good stewardship, it can be life giving to so many people, as water is to a dry desert.

Friends, collective action is a powerful thing. We can do far more together than we could ever do on our own; all gifts are important—both large and small.

Success is doing our best to put the largest dent possible in the cost of the HVAC project, together.

Atkinson endowed chair in Religious and Ethical Studies at Willamette University, where he teaches courses on the history of religion. He will speak on his awardwinning book: The Lost Creed. Elizabeth Schrader Polczer is Assistant Professor of New Testament at Villanova University, having recently defended her PhD in Early Christianity and New Testament at Duke University. Sunday Enrichment: Grasshoppers in My Bed - Lillie Belle Gibbs -Minnesota Farm Girl, 1877 with Author Terry Swanson

This book is an imagined diary that highlights the everyday happenings of real-life girl Lillie Belle Gibbs and her experiences on the family farm in the late 1870s. A Minnesota historian, she specializes in public history in the Twin Cities area. Because it is Lent, because we are in the midst of many changes, and a capital campaign, we are offering a few hours away from the world to talk about prayer and to practice different forms of prayer.

The program will be followed by the opportunity to visit Prayer Stations that offer suggestions for a variety of ways to pray. The HOH portable Labyrinth will also be available during open time.

Prayer is often thought of as a pouring out of gratitude or concerns before God. I can also be a conversation where we both speak and listen. Contemplative prayer is only listening; using a sacred word to call oneself into prayer and back from a wandering mind, the practitioner continues to let go of their own thoughts, worries, or curiosities to listen for and rest in God. Prayer can take many forms. Prayer can be walking, dancing, writing, singing, chant, or listening to scripture or music. Our knitters pray while creating a prayer shawl just as other forms of art or action can be a prayer. Prayer in a way is about our intent to be nearer to God. All are welcome to take some time away.

Since March of 2020, House of Hope has been certified as an Earth Care Congregation of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Earth Care Congregations initially commit to an Earth Care Pledge, developed by the Social Justice and Peacemaking Unit of the PC (USA), to care for God's creation in areas of worship, education, facilities, and outreach. Our Session affirmed that pledge in November 2019. We must also complete an annual audit showing that we accomplished a required number of actions in the past year in each of those four areas. Each February we apply for recertification. HOH is currently one of eleven Earth Care Congregations in the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area. 1 in 9 people in Minnesota have limited or uncertain access to adequate food. You can make a difference during the March Food

Drive as we support the food pantries at Hallie Q. Brown Community Center and Neighborhood House. Rising food costs and inflation are drastically affecting families in our community. More people than ever are turning to food pantries for support, and the truth is, food banks are strained to keep up with the increased need. In 2023, a record-breaking total of 7.5 million visits were recorded at Minnesota food shelves, compared to 5.5 million in 2022 and 3.5 million in 2021.

Our March Food Drive is vitally important as we help the 1 in 8 hungry

children, or 1 in 9 people overall. Food insecurity makes children uneasy, stressed, and unable to concentrate. Parents worry they can't fulfill basic food needs for their family.
