Mozart's Coronation Mass | May 19



The House of Hope Motet Choir will perform Mozart's *Coronation Mass,* K.317, a favorite of The Motet Choir and congregation. Mozart composed this mass, one of his 19 Mass settings, including the *Requiem*, in 1779 near the end of his tenure working for Archbishop Colloredo in Salzburg at the age of 23. A few fun facts to whet your interest:

- Mozart composed the solos with choir members in mind, and for the May 19 performance, all 10 of the HOH Section Leaders will make a solo appearance.
- Where are the violas? Although Mozart included oboes, trumpets, horns, and timpani, there are no violas in the string section. This is in keeping with a church sonata/trio orchestration of 2 violins and continuo (celli, bass, organ).
- Composing Mass settings was an activity based on liturgical norms. In two key instances, Mozart (to the Archbishop's chagrin) broke away from these standards: first, at the conclusion of the Credo movement after the first "Amen," Mozart has the choir reiterate the opening line of text (*Credo in unum Deum*) and throws in extra Amens to boot. This may have been the first time in history that a composer did that, and Beethoven repeated the choice in his *Missa Solemnis*. The second creative break from norms comes in the middle of the Benedictus (sung by solo quartet), when the choir interjects one of three utterances of the "Hosanna in excelsis" material. One may chuckle when the solo quartet then continues back in their rather pastorale character as if the choir's outburst never happened.
- We witness a little bit of foreshadowing (and future musical recycling) when introduced to the lovely soprano solo in the Agnus Dei movement. This material serves as a little more than inspiration for the aria "Dove Sono" from *Le nozze de Figaro*. Matthew Culloton

Membership Development Committee Becomes Community Engagement

Everyone wants to know the secrets to church growth. Is it a charismatic pastoral leader? Is it programming designed to attract younger people? It is a particular "brand" of theology? Is it gourmet coffee?

No doubt, most people within the church are aware that overall church attendance and church affiliation has been declining in the United States for some time and these trends have accelerated as a result of the pandemic. In addition, many people within the church today are alarmed at the hastened pace of secularization in our society and the emergence of a large group of people who claim, "no particular religious affiliation." Here are a few church growth/church decline facts that you may find to be surprising:

- Conservative churches have been losing membership at a much higher rate than moderate/liberal churches over the past decade or more.
- A majority of young people who have left their churches in recent years say the negative treatment of LGBTQ people in their church or denomination is their main reason for leaving.
- A majority of larger churches (1,000 members plus) in all denominations continue to grow while many small to medium size churches are declining.
- Many of the fastest growing churches in the country are the most racially diverse.

Some of this has to do with changing demographics. For example, churches located in parts of the country that have declining populations (such as rural, small town, and ex-urban areas) have seen a significant number of church closures. Moreover, small neighborhood churches located in older suburban areas in large cities have also struggled and seen significant decline. Frequently this results from changing racial/ethnic demographics in the neighborhoods

around these churches and the inability of majority white congregations to become more diverse.

There is, however, a common denominator that is seen in churches that are growing despite the overall downturn in religious affiliation and practice: it's *relationship building*. Churches that are succeeding in our current religious climate are really good at building relationships with people outside of their congregations and in welcoming and assimilating new people into their communities. And they are very intentional about these things and work hard at them.

For instance, these churches have identified needs in the neighborhoods around them that the church is uniquely qualified to help with. One church I am familiar with has become the "environmental justice hub" of their community where dozens of volunteers work in a variety of ways to help their city become "greener" by hastening the transition to renewable forms of energy. Do all of these people become a part of this church? No, but many do through the relationship building process that takes place over time and the recognition by people in the community that the church has a deep commitment, rooted in its theology, for a more environmentally just world. This is a revelation for many people and enables them to engage with the Christian tradition in a way they previously thought was impossible. Of course, every congregation and community are unique, but this is an illustration of how many growing churches do membership development in the 21st century. Recognizing the need for a shift in emphasis, HOH's Session at its February meeting made the decision to take membership development in a whole new direction though a new Community Engagement model.

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The new committee will:

- Engage with less active members and friends of HOH to encourage participation in worship, fellowship, education, music, and service opportunities.
- Periodically provide introductory classes on Christianity, the Bible, Spirituality, and Reformed Theology, as a regular and integrated part of the overall educational program.
- Provide new fellowship opportunities to deepen a sense of community and belonging within the congregation across generations.
- Engage with people who live in the neighborhoods around the church in a variety of ways: through organizing to meet community needs; providing meeting and fellowship space for community groups; and

developing and implementing "good neighbor" events and programs in partnership with those living in the neighborhoods.

A couple of organizational/brainstorming meetings for the new committee will take place in the coming weeks with new, phased-in programming starting in the fall. If you have any interest in participating in this new ministry, please contact the church office. I believe that this new approach to outreach (both within and outside of the congregation) has the potential to revitalize and renew the congregation in a whole variety of positive ways. Please consider how you might participate in making this a reality.

Telecoil Hearing Loop Installed in Sanctuary

A hearing loop is a wire that circles a room and is connected to the sound system. The signal is then picked up by telecoil-equipped hearing aids and cochlear implants.

On Sunday, May 5, Rick Korinek of Midwest Hearing Loops will make a presentation about the hearing loop at 11:15 a.m. in the sanctuary.



Plant a Bee Lawn

Would you like your lawn to help our native pollinators? You can by making it do double duty. A bee lawn can provide not only recreational space for you, your family and pets, but also much-needed food resources for bees and other beneficial pollinators.

One way to provide resources for pollinators while keeping the function of a lawn is to incorporate other plants such as Dutch white clover, self-heal thyme, and creeping thyme. These plants have the right type of flowers for bees, adapt to being mowed, and tolerate foot traffic. And, once established, a bee lawn may take less work to maintain than a traditional lawn.
