Handel became Composer in Residence at Cannons in Middlesex in 1717, marking a brief but fruitful creative period in his life. His employer was James Brydges, who became the First Duke of Chandos. During this time, Handel composed a number of anthems which are known as the Chandos Anthems, sung in a chapel that was remodeled and finished in 1716 in a manner befitting the Baroque era. The surviving parts of the organ that Handel played are still found in the chapel today. For the anthems,

House of Hope welcomes Dr. Kate Bowler to our Sunday Series on Sunday, November 3 at 2 p.m. Kate Bowler, PhD is a four time *New York Times* bestselling author, award-winning podcast host, and

an Associate Professor of American Religious History at Duke University. She studies the cultural stories we tell ourselves about success, suffering, and whether (or not) we're capable of change. After being unexpectedly diagnosed with Stage IV cancer at age 35, she penned the *New York Times* bestselling memoir, *Everything Happens for a Reason (and Other Lies I've Loved)* and *No Cure For Being Human (and Other Truths I Need to Hear)*. Kate hosts the award-winning *Everything Happens* podcast where, in warm, insightful, often funny conversations, she talks with people like Malcolm Gladwell and Beth Moore about what they've learned in difficult times.

A selection of her books will be available for purchase from SubText Books in St. Paul.

Handel relied on Psalm settings, which was the first time he had set these texts. The works were specifically written for the ensembles that were employed at Cannons - most were for three part choir of sopranos, tenors, and basses, and a small orchestral force of violins 1 and 2, oboe, and bass instruments. Not all of the anthems were for three parts, so we're happy to say that the Motet Choir altos will, in fact, be working as hard as everyone else! Noteworthy to the House of Hope: Handel's primary theme for this anthem (recurring many times throughout) is the opening musical phrase to the hymn tune SAINT ANNE - which we sing as O God Our Help in Ages Past. – Matthew Culloton

Because people need a sense of transcendence in their lives, and this is best experienced in community—through connecting with other people and rubbing shoulders with people who are different than they are.

In my mind, this is a kind of miracle where people voluntarily join together and pool their resources to create places where community can thrive, and lifetime connections are made to sustain one another through the joys and sorrows of life.

And so, I am asking for your generous financial support as we seek to strengthen the connections that bind us together as a community of faith. Good things are happening at House of Hope Presbyterian Church! The HVAC and electrical construction project is now complete, and there is a renewed commitment to hospitality and neighborliness, among many other signs of growth and vitality.

A Sustainable Thanksgiving

As you prepare to gather with family and friends this Thanksgiving, consider how to make it a more sustainable feast to minimize your carbon footprint. Look for locally sourced and organic foods at the St. Paul Farmers' Market, area co-ops, or the local/ organic section of your grocery store. Use natural decorations like gourds, leaves, and pine cones that can be composted afterward. Ask guests to bring a dish to share—to lighten your load and promote a diverse meal without over preparation on your part. Use reusable containers for leftovers instead of disposable ones and ask guests to bring their own. Start by taking one of these or another small step to help make your Thanksgiving both honor tradition and support the environment.

SCOTLAND PILGRIMAGE

Twenty-seven members and friends of House of Hope gathered in Edinburgh on September 18 as pilgrims and boarded a bus to the south.
