Easter Sunday will be my "swan song" at House of Hope. It has been an eventful and memorable (almost) three years of transitional ministry.

And a lot has happened both personally and professionally during this time:

- Gail and I are now the proud grandparents of two granddaughters: Jacqueline and Caroline.
- My father died last spring after a long illness.
- Our daughter, Mary Elizabeth, got engaged and will be married this summer in August.
   Joys and sorrows.

And professionally, my time at HOH has been a whirlwind:

- Calming the storm of discontent that existed within the congregation in the spring and summer of 2022.
- Visioning a new future through "Catch the Vision, Dream the Dream," the "Dreamscape" and the "Master Site (architectural) Plan."
- Preparing and carrying out a Capital Campaign for the HVAC/Utility Infrastructure Improvement Project.
- Establishing a new Foundation, a 501(c)(3), to pursue grant funding to assist in the care and upkeep of the church's buildings and campus, and to expand music and arts programming.

Add to this the completion of a successful search and call process for a new Senior Pastor, Head of Staff, and you have a transitional time

that has not just been successful but is designed to launch HOH into the future on a path of growth, sustainability, and effective service to community and world.

## Transformation is the goal of transitional ministry.

Did we get everything done? No. But we addressed most of the big stuff: the church's finances and the need for a plan to care for and improve the church's historic buildings over time, the need for a new outreach strategy that focuses both on the neighborhoods around the church and the larger metro area and developing partnerships with other religious organizations and nonprofits in the area to better utilize our buildings and expand our reach and impact.

I want to thank the many hundreds of people at HOH, as well as the church staff, who have actively helped in all of these endeavors during my time with you. There have been thousands of conversations, interactions and experiences we have shared. I greatly appreciate it. It has been a pleasure and honor to serve with you. I am "bullish" on House of Hope, and I look forward to seeing you go from strength to strength in the coming years.


### **Capital Campaign Update**

# Campaign Surpasses \$5 Million

# **Upcoming Capital Improvements: Roof Repairs and Solar Panels**



At the March 18 meeting of the Session, the elders received a report from the House, Property, and Insurance Committee regarding major roofing work that is needed in order to maintain the integrity of the building envelope. The Session voted unanimously to go ahead with the full project which will be funded from the Legacy Building

Fund. The project will begin after Easter, and we will, once again, see signs of construction on the Portland side of the building. The project will be completed in three phases and go through the summer months. This may mean some adjustments in room use and scheduling. We will keep you informed as we go along.

#### Phase 1

The flat roofs are currently showing significant signs of deterioration and water infiltration and need to be replaced. This work will begin after Easter.

#### Phase 2

The slate roofs, while overall in sound condition and expected to last decades, have a number of broken and missing tiles that need to be replaced. Additional work will provide needed repairs to flashings and replacement of deteriorated capstone sealants. This work will be from mid-June to August.

#### Phase 3

With replacement of the flat roofs, HOH can now proceed with the installation of solar panels. The system to be installed is expected to provide approximately 25% of the church's electricity needs. Work is expected to begin in June and be completed by August.
