Motet Choir to Premiere Matthew Culloton's This Place: A House of Hope Music Sunday, May 18



Commissioned for the Motet Choir by ensemble member Gail Tritle, Choirmaster Matthew Culloton has composed a fourmovement work called This Place: A House of Hope that will be premiered on Sunday, May 18 as the anchor of the Music Sunday service. The work is scored for choir, vocal soloists, flute, oboe,

clarinet, bassoon, harp, piano, and percussion. The texts of the work were selected to highlight the appreciation of the HOH sanctuary, values, and love of music. The first movement, Behold the Tabernacle, is drawn from a Sarum Antiphon, reminding that the temple of God is holy, and the joys of the temple should be celebrated with festivity. The second movement sets a favorite Latin text (often sung to Bruckner's anthem), Locus Iste, which states that "This place was made by God." Hildegard von Bingen's text on wisdom, O virtus Sapientiae, is the third movement, and features three soprano soloists taking flight above the choir (not literally!). The final movement, Our Songs of Joy, is excerpted from Psalms 126 and 118 the choir waking from a dream and finding the Lord has done great things for us.

A Note from Julia

The Gift of Transformation

Last October I thought I was planning my vacation to hit well after our new pastor started. As it is, I will be gone from April 28- May 11 and return just as Scott Jones begins his ministry at House of Hope. Perfect timing in a way. After three pilgrimages to Scotland, I'm going there as a tourist. I'm going to Scotland in the time between the two Scotts. I am looking forward to time away just as I am looking forward to returning and beginning a new era at HOH.

These past years have been challenging and they have been transformative. We expected one interim and got two; we planned for one transition and were gifted with two. We kept on keeping on through a world-wide pandemic and a major construction project. Our leadership boards guided us carefully and daringly through it all. The amazing thing about God is that there are always gifts from the journey even when the route includes detours that take us the long way around. What have you learned in these past five plus years about perseverance and faith, about church and change, about God's purposes and ability to redeem?

Yes, it's been challenging! But we've also had opportunities for growth that we didn't expect. The wonderful work we have begun through our interim time will be carried forward into fruition. And as we have just learned, there will be the things that we plan and then there's what really happens. God is in the midst of both.

We have imagined a future and now we are invited to let our hopes lean into ongoing discernment with God and one another to find our way beyond our human visions. As I have shared a number of times since finishing my classes, our mantra from the Missional DMin group was this: "The church doesn't have a mission. God's mission has a church."

We are not the same congregation that we were in 2018. We have changed as individuals and a community since 2020. We are church in order to be changed by relationship, by working together on projects; by listening, agreeing, and disagreeing; by sharing a donut wall and voting in chili contests! This is transformation, metamorphosis in the biblical Greek. Meta meaning 'more or beyond' and morph meaning 'form or shape.' As individuals and as a congregation, we are invited to allow God to give us shape and form and take us beyond our understanding and practice of being church from the past to be fully present to the now. Spiritual life is a journey and, along the way, God schools us in the Way of Jesus Christ which invites personal and corporate transformation. Thanks be to God.

Books, Books, Books! The Libraries of House of Hope



If you haven't been to the library on the west side of the building near the Church Office lately, please drop in. The books are back and the room has now been refurnished. The new configuration offers comfortable seating at each end for conversation, reading, and discussion groups. It can even be a meditation space with our new Sisyphus Sand Art Table. As with the rest of the building, the art has been refreshed.

Our beloved library table takes the center space where it is more protected from the glare from the windows at certain times during the day. The table is also easily moved to the back wall of the library so the center of the room can be set up for small lectures or recitals with additional seating on the sides. This west side library primarily holds resources for adults. However, the addition of new collection of Teen and Young Adult books will soon be underway. We hope this will invite the youth into the adult library as they mature. There will also be a small collection of children's books that are used in Sunday School available for adults to read who might be interested in seeing what we use as part of our curriculum. Parents who come with kids will also be able to read these books.

The **Children's Library** in the East Wing is also restored to its preconstruction glory. There is also a bookcase with a variety of spiritual, theological, biblical, and Christian Life resources for families and adults outside the Kirk Parlour kitchen.
