Katherine Stewart is an investigative journalist and the author of the New York Times bestselling Money, Lies, and God: Inside the Movement to Destroy American Democracy (Bloomsbury, 2025). Her previous book, The Power Worshippers: Inside the Dangerous

Rise of Religious Nationalism (Bloomsbury, 2020) formed the basis of the documentary feature God & Country, produced by Rob Reiner. The Power Worshippers was also awarded First Place in the Nonfiction Books category by the Religion News Association, among other prizes, and was Union Theological Seminary's Fall Read. Stewart's work appears in The New York Times op ed, New Republic, Religion News Service and others. Her focus on November 9 will include ways in which faith communities can work to defend democracy. A Note from Scott

"The grace that is necessary to change things radically exists and is at work in the world now, providing human beings with everything they need to live life differently." So writes Kathryn Tanner in her insightful book Christianity and the New Spirit of Capitalism. Kathryn Tanner will give a presentation to us during a luncheon following worship on Stewardship Sunday, November 16.

Tanner is a Professor of Divinity and Religious Studies at Yale University. According to her bio, "Her research relates the history of Christian thought to contemporary issues of theological concern using social, cultural, and feminist theory." What impressed me about her book was the way she used core doctrines of Christian thought to examine critically the current, dominate economic system. Particularly the current economic model's use of scarcity to promote fear, which leads to people being stressed and burned out, missing out on the good life that God created us for. Her work invites us to think theologically about money, work, finance, etc. To imagine a different, better world that more fully enjoys the abundance of God's grace.

One of my early takeaways from conversations with many of you is that House of Hope needs to have an open conversation about money—how we raise it, invest it, budget it, spend it, report on it, etc. So we are

taking steps in forming a new Finance Committee, planning educational reports to Session, and have hired a new Director of Development to assist us in developing current best practices.

But I believe that our conversation shouldn't just be about nuts and bolts like fund allocation or audits or financial reports. The conversation should be rooted in our theological understanding. Tanner's presentation on November 16, as part of our season of stewardship and our annual pledge drive, will be a component of that. Helping us to think and imagine in new ways, rooted in our faith in God.

The Stewardship Committee has also asked me to lead an Adult Enrichment session on Sunday, November 2 about the church's finances. That's more the nuts and bolts part. So please save those dates now.

Of course, all of our financial workings are in service to God's mission. And it's very clear to me that God is using House of Hope to achieve God's purposes—to create a caring and resilient community of belonging that bears witness to our spiritual and humane values, such as beauty, joy, peace, justice, and love.

Kathryn Tanner reminds us, "The fulsome character of grace means... one has all one needs now to meet the present the challenge."

Presbytery Grant

Hope Arts Center recently received a \$20,000 grant from the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area to refresh the stage in the Great Hall. This funding will provide new drapery, a sound amplification solution, and improved ADA accessibility. It marks the first phase of a larger project that will eventually include upgraded lighting and additional audio improvements for the space.

HOH Roofing Project Update

Phase 1 - With an unusual number of rain delay days this summer, the flat roof replacement work has fallen behind the original schedule but with diligent effort by the contractor is now nearly completed. All of the new insulation and EPDM membrane is in place with a small amount of flashing and interior patching work needing completion.

Phase 2 - The slate roof and sealant repair work is in progress and anticipated for completion by late October.

Phase 3 - Placement of photovoltaic panels started on September 15 as pictured above and will take several weeks to install approximately 100 panels and connect the two arrays into the church's electrical system. Look for further updates and photos when the solar panel installation is complete!

Americans throw away nearly 120 million pounds of food every year, almost 40% of our country's entire food supply. To reduce food waste, plan your meals, create a shopping list, and buy only what you need. Buy fresh produce in smaller quantities, especially highly perishable items. Properly store your groceries to extend their shelf life. Buying local and seasonal produce can reduce food waste by shortening the distance food travels. Incorporate leftovers in your meals.
